What If This Road by Sheenagh Pugh

Message from the RE Coordinator

Kids' Place

Compassion for the children in our midst is one of the most important things that we can practice to help raise kids who will go out into the world as representatives of our values and principles. Thich Nhat Hanh wrote the following (excerpted from A Sleeping Child):

There are times when you may sit and look at a child when they're sleeping. While the child sleeps, they reveal tenderness, suffering, and hope. Just contemplate a child sleeping and observe your own feelings. Understanding and compassion will arise in you, and you will know how to take care of that child and make them happy.

Whether parent, grandparent, sibling, caregiver, or friend, we can all take a moment to look through the (sleeping) eyes of a child, and see the world from their point of view.

Famous UUs in History

Joseph Priestly, 1733-1804, was the discoverer of oxygen in the mid-1770s via observations regarding photosynthesis, the ability of the mystery gas (O2) to sustain life, and the flammability of the mystery gas. What does this have to do with his being a UU?

When James Cook undertook his second voyage in 1773, the purpose of which was to prove or disprove the existence of Terra Australis (a mysterious land fabled to be south of Australia), he need a science advisor for the voyage. Needing a well-regarded British scientist, he asked Joseph Priestly. But, as a liberal minister, theologian, and what was known as a "Dissenter (someone who was not a member of the Church of England)", Priestly had rankled the Anglicans. Cook was forced to choose another science advisor.

As a result, Priestly was forced into other scientific endeavors, and, as a result, we breath what is known as air with "oxygen" in it, instead of what was previously called "phlogisticated air".

The challenges, the call, and the opportunity of this moment in Unitarian Universalism and in the broader US American society are compelling. Unitarian Universalists must be prepared and willing to look inward, examining, exploring, and acting to dismantle white supremacy culture in our association, in our congregations and groups, and in ourselves. At the same time, we must be prepared and willing to look outward and act to lift up Unitarian Universalist values in the political and civic challenges of our time. The UU Common Read Selection Committee has chosen *two* books for this year's Common Read which we will consider in our All Church Read later in the church year:

- 1. *Centering: Navigating Race, Authenticity, and Power in Ministry*, edited by Mitra Rahnema (Skinner House, 2017), centers the stories, analysis, and insights of a number of Unitarian Universalist religious leaders of color as they explore how racial identity is made both visible and invisible in Unitarian Universalist communities.
- <u>Daring Democracy: Igniting Power, Meaning, and Connection for the America We Want</u>, by Frances Moore Lappé and Adam Eichen, (Beacon Press, September 2017) lifts up the importance of democracy itself. It examines the anti-democracy movement that led to the Trump presidency, then offers a vision and call to action to save the democracy we thought we had and to take our civic life to a place it has never been.

SANTA PAULA CINEMA SOCIETY presents NIGHT TRAIN TO MUNICH

This 1940 film fits squarely into a small and unique genre of movie-making from the years immediately preceding the U.S. entry into World War II, produced in no small part to raise the consciousness of U.S. audiences to the events then unfolding in Europe. Many of these films made in the 1939-41 timeframe came from British filmmakers, still working in their home countries, or as expatriates at Hollywood studios. Among this grouping are Hitchcock's *Foreign Correspondent*, Pressburger Powell's 49th Parallel, and Chaplin's *The Great Dictator*. Domestic directors pitched in with a number of prewar films that were decidedly about the war, including *The Mortal Storm, Casablanca, Mrs. Miniver*, and *To Be or Not to Be*.

Night Train to Munich, from The Third Man director Carol Reed, ably borrows not only from Hitchcock's suspense style and his lightly romantic and humorous approach to the thriller, but also two supporting characters from his 1938 film The Lady Vanishes. This lead some to label this film a remake of, or sequel to, the Hitchcock film. It really isn't, yet the connection was no coincidence, either, as the films shared the same screenwriters (Sidney Gilliat and Frank Launder), and leading lady Margaret Lockwood.

The action begins in Prague in 1939 on the eve of the Nazi takeover of Czechoslovakia, and continues onto Britain and Germany, building to a memorable (and clearly Hitchcock-inspired) confrontation on a cable car bound for Switzerland. Also with Rex Harrison and Paul Hernreid (1:35).

DINNER AND A MOVIE

Social Concerns Action Committee presents Frontline: Exodus, (released December 2016). Friday, July 25 Potluck 5:45 PM Movie: 7:00 PM

This two-hour film draws on camera and smartphone footage filmed by refugees and migrants themselves – from inside a sinking dinghy on a route across the Mediterranean Sea where thousands have died, to the tents and fires inside Calais's notorious "Jungle" camp.

Through its harrowing access and intimacy, "Exodus" vividly exposes a shadow-world of human traffickers exploiting the crisis for profit, how countries are handling the influx of people, and the challenges and choices these refugees and migrants face every day.

"Anyone can become a refugee," says Hassan, a former English teacher who fled his home in Damascus, after he says he was beaten by government forces. *"It's not something which you choose, it's something that happens to you."* Hassan's journey is one of several at the heart of Exodus. Discussion follows.
