Board Notes

Once upon a time, in 1892, our church building was new. Everyone was so proud of it. Now it is old and everyone is still proud of it. We all love the bricks and mortar and rich old wood but we who worship in the building can also be proud of all the events that have occurred here in over 100 years. We can also take pride in all the many events that keep us all busy and productive going on today.

There are many projects and activities to keep our old building running smoothly. We are designing a new sign for the front of the church. The vintage wood on the walls and doors needs some stain and polish. New shelves need to be built to store all the supplies it takes to run our organization. The board and members of the congregation have been making lists and checking them twice. The lists are getting organized and prioritized so we know what to do when. Some jobs are perfect for volunteers and some jobs must be placed in the hands of skilled professionals. Take a look at the new literature racks near the restrooms. And the calendar and bulletin boards near the kitchen. Watch for more action in the future.

In 1923 a brand new Estey organ was installed in the church. The new pipes for that organ required the sealing of the front door on the northwest corner of the building to create space for all the pipes. Stairs lead up to that door that has been shut since 1923. To blow air into the pipes at the touch of a key on the organ required a huge electrical motor in the basement hooked up to large metal tubes. We modernized the organ blower system over 10 years ago and no longer needed the old organ blower motor. Our organ repair experts advised us that the old motors were too noisy to be of any use and we should remove it and recycle it properly. We recently hired an expert to do that job. The result is a vacant space that can now be used for storing supplies in a secret room behind a secret door in the old downstairs kitchen area. Special tours of that room are available upon request.

Watch this space for more reports on fixing and maintaining the old and traveling into the future to discover the new.

In addition to the huge archive of physical documents and photographs that go back to the 1890s the church will also be maintaining a digital archive. Both photographs and documents can be digitized as you know. Back in 1985, before computers and scanners were everywhere I photographed this photograph to a negative for printing. For the Newsletter I scanned that negative at high resolution, cropped it and digitally removed dust spots and enhanced the contrast. A better way of doing

that now would be to go back to the original print and scan that. It does take certain skills but nothing that can not be learned. Our archives can now contain the original paper print, a high resolution digital scan for making large prints and a web size image like this for electronic distribution. J.N.

Message from the RE Coordinator

It's hard to believe this will be my last RE Newsletter article. I began volunteering as the Director of RE back in the days when Melitta Haslund was our minister. I had a wonderful assistant at the time, Heather Poehler-Miller. We did some wonderful things in RE. There were two classrooms going on at the same time: one for elementary children and one for preschoolers. We even had someone hired to watch the infants. There was also a time when we had a few youths in our program. I can remember transporting one of our youths over the hill to attend an OWL class in Thousand Oaks. I will always cherish those car rides when I got the opportunity to really get to know our youth.

In 2012, I finally decided to pull away from volunteering in the RE program. That is when our interim minister, Kristin Kohn, stressed to the Board the importance of having an active Religious Education program in place when recruiting a full-time minister. The Board agreed to create a paid RE position. Since I had recently retired from the school district and could use a few extra dollars to help my family get by, I decided to apply.

I believe the interview panel selected me because of my years of experience as well as my positive relationship with the children. The panel thought it would be better to hire someone the children already had developed a strong relationship with. The rest is history.

For years, Yvon Ortega was my assistant. We had a wonderful working relationship. She would bring her children to class and I have grown very fond of them over the years. I have "adopted" them as my grandchildren since my two daughters do not have any children. It was a win-win situation.

In 2016 when Yvon had her third child, she decided to resign from her RE position. We were fortunate to have an active parent that was willing to step in and take Yvon's place. Her name is Lana Moore who is an experienced Montessori teacher and she has brought so much to our program. Last spring, we changed our curriculum to "Spirit Play" which is a program based on Montessori teachings. I would have never been able to implement the program without her support and experience.

I know I will miss the children the most. There is something about interacting with the brilliant minds of our UU children. I am in awe every time we meet. It is an honor to know that I helped shape the minds of our children in a positive and loving way. One of my favorite things about our RE program is that children are encouraged to ask questions.

The time has come for me to bid farewell to the RE program and let someone else take over. I will be forever grateful for the opportunity to work as an employee for the church community that I love. Thank you so very much.

DAYTIME FIVE WISHES WORKSHIP AT LIBRARY

On Wednesday, July 12 at 3:00 PM at the Blanchard Community Library, Rev. Maddie will repeat her workshop open to all on planning for the end of life using the outstanding document, *Five Wishes*. This document is an easy to use legal document written in everyday language that lets adults of all ages plan how they want to be cared for in the case they become seriously ill. It is America's most popular living will with more than 14 million copies in circulation.

Five Wishes helps you express how you want to be treated if you are seriously ill and unable to speak for yourself. It is unique among all other living will and health agent forms because it speaks to all a person's needs: medical, personal, emotional and spiritual. *Five Wishes* also helps structure discussions with your family and physician. It is also a great tool to focus discussions with aging relatives so that you know their wishes.

Five Wishes is a legal document in California. There are only eight states remaining in which *Five Wishes* does not yet meet the legal requirements. These states either require a specific state form or that the person completing an advance directive be given a mandatory notice or "warning." Residents of these states can still use *Five Wishes* to put their wishes in writing and communicate their wishes with their family and physician. Most health care professionals understand they have a duty to listen to the wishes of their patients no matter how they are expressed.

Five Wishes was introduced and originally distributed with support from a generous grant by The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the nation's largest philanthropy devoted exclusively to health and health care.

Rev. Maddie will present the *Five Wishes* document and talk about the issues involved. *Five Wishes* will be available to all participants. There is no cost; a donation of \$5.00 is recommended to defray costs.

SANTA PAULA CINEMA SOCIETY PRESENTS A STAR IS BORN

The 1954 edition of "A Star is Born" was the second of three versions of this showbiz musical melodrama to be filmed (so far, another is coming next year). It proved to be the ultimate vehicle for Judy Garland, and also her big comeback after spending years in Hollywood purgatory. Under the direction of George Cukor and armed with songs by Harold Arlen and Ira Gershwin, Garland unleashed everything in her arsenal for this one, and few in film history had anywhere close to as much to give to a camera. The film was an immediate sensation, but what happened next is a true story even sadder than the on-screen fiction. Immediately after its release, due to exhibitor complaints about its length, the film was substantially cut by the studio, and the removed parts unceremoniously discarded. Reconstructing the film to Cukor's original cut became one of the greatest movie treasure hunts of all time. What we see today is not the complete original, but as fully restored as film historians could make it. With James Mason and Jack Carson. Long, but worth every minute. (2:56)

He received his Master's degree in composition from the University of California at Los Angeles, doing further study at the University of Southern California and the Royal Flemish Conservatory in Antwerp, Belgium. His teachers included Roy Harris, Lukas Foss, Ingolf Dahl, Flor Peeters, Halsey Stevens and Leonard Stein. As an educator, he has taught at Los Angeles City College, UCLA and UC Berkeley. He also served as a composer-in-residence to six colleges in Kansas under a grant from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare. As a performer, he founded the John Biggs Consort, which toured internationally under Columbia Artists Management, specializing in medieval, renaissance, and twentieth century music. As a composer, he has won numerous awards and honors including a Rockefeller Grant, Fulbright Grant, Atwater-Kent Award, ASCAP "Serious Music Award" and a number of "Meet the Composer" grants from diverse parts of the United States.
