# Message from the Minister

I am writing my words this morning at the cottage of a childhood friend in Chatham, Massachusetts, which is right at the "elbow" of Cape Cod. It is a beautiful, sunny, Cape sort of day—a little muggy, with colorful East Coast birds darting at the feeder in the window. I have been very busy since I have seen you, with my summer vacation and study leave turning out to be much different than I had planned for...but isn't that like life? There have been crises amongst my friends and family and it has been a gift that I have been able to be present for them. I am hoping now that I will be able to settle in for these last two weeks for the beachy kind of stuff you do on the Cape and the woodsy kind of stuff you do in New Hampshire. I hope your summer has had some smooth paths with not too many twists and turns. And I hope you have been bringing water back for our Gathering of the Waters Service on September 10. I know I will be bringing water from the Atlantic Ocean where I went on a cruise of Boston Harbor for a 70<sup>th</sup> birthday and where I will be going to the beach today, the Sudbury River in Massachusetts which winds through Wayland where I used to live and Sudbury where I stay with friends when I return, the Connecticut River which I have passed several times this trip, and Lake Winnipesaukee in New Hampshire where I stayed several days at my friend's lake house and the Sandy Island YMCA Family Camp where I led worship two Sundays.

Along with the unexpected low points, there have been a number of high points including going to Tanglewood, the summer home of the Boston Symphony, visiting Saint Gaudens, the National Park at the former residence and studios of sculptor August Saint-Gaudens, and seeing friends and family. What have been your low points and high points? I will want to know.

One of my high points was attending the UU Musician's Network Conference in Arlington, Virginia and having the opportunity to hear the Keynote and attend a workshop by Yara Allen, the songleader with Rev. William Barber of the Moral Mondays and Fusion movement. You will definitely be hearing more about that in the fall. But meanwhile...to the beach!

We arrived at Camp de Benneville Pines in the early afternoon on August 12<sup>th</sup>. for a 4plus day "Campference" called Walking the Walk, presented by the UU Justice Ministry of California. ### All Church Read 2017-18

The challenges, the call, and the opportunity of this moment in Unitarian Universalism and in the broader US American society compelling. are Unitarian Universalists must be prepared and willing to look inward, examining, exploring, and acting to dismantle white supremacy culture in our association, in our congregations and groups, and in ourselves. At the same time, we must be prepared and willing to look outward and act to lift up Unitarian Universalist values in the political and civic challenges of our time. The UU Common Read Selection Committee has chosen two books for this year's Common Read which we will consider in our All Church Read later in the church year:



- 1. *Centering: Navigating Race, Authenticity, and Power in Ministry*, edited by Mitra Rahnema (Skinner House, 2017), centers the stories, analysis, and insights of a number of Unitarian Universalist religious leaders of color as they explore how racial identity is made both visible and invisible in Unitarian Universalist communities.
- <u>Daring Democracy: Igniting Power, Meaning, and Connection for the America We Want</u>, by Frances Moore Lappé and Adam Eichen, (Beacon Press, September 2017) lifts up the importance of democracy itself. It examines the anti-democracy movement that led to the Trump presidency, then offers a vision and call to action to save the democracy we thought we had and to take our civic life to a place it has never been.

The Water Protectors at Standing Rock captured world attention through their peaceful resistance. While many may know the details, *AWAKE*, *A Dream from Standing Rock* captures the story of Native-led defiance that forever changed the fight for clean water, our environment and the future of our planet. The film is a collaboration between Indigenous filmmakers, Director Myron Dewey, Executive Producer Doug Good Feather and environmental Oscar Nominated filmmakers Josh Fox and James Spione. It is a labor of love to support the peaceful movement of the water protectors.

The Dakota Access Pipeline is a controversial project that would bring fracked gas from the Bakken Shale in North Dakota through South Dakota, Iowa and eventually to Illinois. The Standing Rock Nation and people all over the world oppose the project because the pipeline would run under the Missouri river, a source of drinking water for over 18 million people. There are thousands of miles of pipelines in the United States and they leak every single day. Since 2010 over 3,300 oil spills and leaks have been reported.
