## Message from the Board of Trustees


#### **Board Notes**

## Santa Lucia Day



On December 16th, we celebrated Santa Lucia Day with the help of some of the children. Here are a couple of pictures of our service, as well as a little history via Wikipedia of why Saint Lucy is celebrated throughout Scandinavia and Italy (as well as here!).

"Saint Lucy's Day is celebrated most commonly in Scandinavia, with their long dark winters, where it is a major feast day, and in Italy, with each emphasising a different aspect of the story. In Scandinavia, where Saint Lucy is called Santa Lucia in Norwegian and Danish, and Sankta Lucia in Swedish, she is

represented as a lady in a white dress (a symbol of a Christian's white baptismal robe) and red sash (symbolizing the blood of her martyrdom) with a crown or wreath of candles on her head. In Norway, Sweden and Swedish-speaking regions of Finland, as songs are sung, girls dressed as Saint Lucy carry cookies and saffron buns in procession, which "symbolizes bringing the light of Christianity throughout world darkness". In both Protestant and Catholic churches, boys participate in the procession as well, playing different roles associated with Christmas, such as that of Saint Stephen. It is said that to vividly celebrate Saint Lucy's Day will help one live the long winter days with enough light."


## Upcoming RE Youth Classes

#### 1ST QUARTER FIRST SUNDAY PLATE OFFERING

To begin 2019, we will financially support a group that meets weekly right under our own roof, "Project Pride," on Friday evenings led by our own Kate English for our Santa Paula LGBTQ teens. This support group is a program of the One Step A La Vez teen center in Fillmore. The Santa Paula group meets in the UU church basement every Friday creating safe space for teens to bring their whole identities and build healthy connections with other youth and supportive adults. The group is also deeply supported by the Coalition For Family Harmony. We are so grateful to be chosen as a recipient of the First Sunday Plate collection. #### LAST SUNDAY OF EACH MONTH

The Last Sunday of each month we collect canned goods, rice and beans and other non-perishable food for CASP: Community Assistance Santa Paula. CASP, a non-profit organization, provides a Food Pantry to serve the disadvantaged of Santa Paula. Being a community charity, CASP's Food Pantry program is largely dependent on the generosity of its citizens.

#### **WORSHIP TEAM**

The Sunday morning service or "Worship" is a unifying event in the life of our congregation, a place where members and friends come together for inspiration, intellectual challenge, spiritual nourishment, community belonging, intergenerational connections, and continuity with the Unitarian Universalist faith, and where all other areas of church activity can connect, including music, other arts, religious education, social action, hospitality, and stewardship. ### The Heartbreak Kid




Lenny and Lila (Charles Grodin, Jeannie Berlin) get married, and we can tell from the first frames of this film that it's a big mistake. Their honeymoon to Miami Beach is a disaster waiting to happen, but it explodes into a calamity beyond expectation when Lenny encounters the exotic beauty Kelly (Cybill Shepherd) and he sets his mind on winning her. Kelly is so far out of Lenny's league and so culturally foreign to him, she might as well be a space alien. Lenny is undaunted. What could be a situation comedy more suited to TV, or a tribute to the screwball comedies of the '30s and '40s, turns into something much more substantial in the hands of screenwriter Neil Simon and director Elaine May. They spin the fundamental absurdity of Lenny's compulsion into a brutal comedy of embarrassment, and a wicked satire of ambition. This is Simon at his most acid, and less controlled than usual by May's improvisational comedy touch. The film will make you laugh, and squirm. Of the four films directed by Elaine May, this was her second, and the most well received when it was released in 1972. It turned Grodin into an instant box-office item. Yet this neglected classic has been out of print for decades, with no sign that it will ever be rereleased. (Also, not to be confused with the 1993 remake, which wasn't half as good but mysteriously remains available while the far superior original languishes. That's the film business!) With unforgettable supporting roles by Eddie Albert and Audra Lindley as Kelly's parents. Rated R (1:45).



- Spike Lee directs, *Blackkklansman*, a true story set in the early 1970's, a time of great social upheaval as the struggle for civil rights rages on. Ron Stallworth (John David Washington) becomes the first African-American detective on the Colorado Springs Police Department, but his arrival is greeted with skepticism and open hostility by the department's rank and file. Undaunted, Stallworth resolves to make a name for himself and a difference in his community. He bravely sets out on a dangerous mission: infiltrate and expose the Ku Klux Klan. Note the new time. Discussion follows.
- **EXPAND YOUR MIND** Expand Your Mind will meet Sunday, January 13, 2:00 PM at Anna and Jim Cole's house in Ventura to discuss our selected book *America: The Farewell Tour* by Chris Hedges. It is a profound and provocative examination of America in crisis. Chris researched this book by travelling to communities across the country. *Margaret Wilson says, "I recommended this book because it sheds light on troubling aspects of today's world. For instance, why are some liberal churches closing their doors forever? Why did great numbers of people vote for Donald Trump? Why are substance abuse deaths and suicide rates increasing? How come cities (Scranton, PA) are forced to sell their public assets?*
- A new shipment of PALESTINIAN OLIVE OIL has arrived, and bottles are available for a mere \$16 each. We order from a fair-trade source supplying organic extra virgin olive oil grown in Palestine. This source supports the work of farmers in the Ramallah area who are prohibited from selling their oil in neighboring Israel or Jordan. This olive oil is "characterized by its distinct personality, robust aroma, and a flavor evocative of fresh fruit. It has a peppery bite and a hint of bitterness [a desirable trait] that disappears as the oil ages over time. Once you have tried olive oil from Palestine, most other olive oils appear bland by comparison." See Audrey Vincent to place your order.


