Message from the Minister

I write this on the day of the Fall Equinox. I am getting used to California autumns, all the while treasuring the memories of those colorful fall days in Massachusetts. One of the potent perfumes of my childhood was the smell of the piles of leaves that my sister and I would run and jump in. I have a clear picture of my father leaning on his rake watching us with a big smile on his face. And I remember the almost intoxicating smell of burning those leaves in the back yard or at the edge of the road where we lived at the time in Wellesley Hills. Of course, we don't burn piles of leaves anymore. Things change. Another memory is that of carving pumpkins—nothing fancy, just a crooked jack-o-lantern lopsided grin. I remember the sticky, slinky feel of the inside of the pumpkin, plunging my hand in up the elbows to scrape out the insides. Another scent of autumn was the smell of roasting the pumpkin seeds in the oven and their crunchy, salty taste. Nowadays you can buy special pumpkin carving knives and craft works of art from pumpkins suitable for Martha Stewart. And pumpkins come in more than the iconic orange color. Things change. The cycle of life moves on. What do you remember?

Not so long ago I had dinner with a long-time friend who is about to celebrate his seventy-seventh birthday. We surprised him early with a birthday cake, and he remarked that he didn't understand how he was turning seventy-seven since he had never been seventy-six. It seemed like just last year was his big 75th Birthday Party! Each of us is in the cycle of life that keeps moving on, from birth to youth to adult to elder, just as our Earth moves through its cycles of death to rebirth. And as we get older, it seems to move faster and faster. It is all the natural cycle of changes, of movement, of dark to light and back to dark again. Ancient cultures celebrated these changes, as do those among us who draw on "the spiritual teachings of Earth-centered traditions which celebrate the sacred circle of life and instruct us to live in harmony with the rhythms of nature" of our Sixth Source in the UU Principles and Purposes.

As you move through this beautiful month which points us toward the darkness with cooler nights, may you think about the cycle of your life and who contributed to it. On Sunday, October 29 we will be constructing our traditional Day of the Dead altar with pictures of your loved ones, those more recently lost but also your ancestors who have made you who you are. Bring also an item which is important to you—your grandfather's watch, your mother's ring, a card from someone you loved or whatever. Or you may wish to attend our Tuesday, October 3rd Gathering which will have the theme "Autumn". Geno Palilla, Christine Snipes, and Atul Ranchod will once more join me for beautiful words, music and silence. **Let us celebrate the cycle of light to dark to light.**

The Universalists focused on the matters of heart with the slogan "love over creed," while the Unitarians focused on ethics and the good life with the slogan "salvation by character."




Underwater Dreams


