Message from the Minister

One of my favorite readings in the back of our hymnal *Singing the Living Tradition* was written by Unitarian minister Edward Everett Hale (1822-1909). You have probably heard me trot it out before, but I believe bears repeating—often—and is central to us on the path of our Unitarian Universalist faith and to our sanity in looking at a world that needs so much of our attention. Hale's words continue to give wisdom:

I am only one
But still I am one.
I cannot do everything,
But still I can do something.
And because I cannot do everything
I will not refuse to do the something I can do.

Hale served churches in the Boston area where I am from, but he was also the chaplain of the United States Senate. He was the author of the classic *The Man Without a Country*, among numerous poems and other writings. Much of his life was devoted to the cause of international peace. It seems often that we are asked to give, give, give. Give to the offertory plate on Sunday or to our stewardship campaign which we are kicking off this month in the Canvass that is how we support this congregation. Give to the free will offerings that support the activities in our Spiritual Growth Center, Rise Up Singing, or our Tuesday night Gatherings. Give to the Red Cross or the United Way or the Salvation Army. Give to the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) or to world hunger relief. Give to organizations working towards international peace. So many ways to give. And sometimes we just don't have the money or time to give. And sometimes we need to be on the receiving end.

I am reflecting this fall on giving and receiving and how we discern for ourselves what is the one something we CAN do. Or two somethings. Or three somethings. We certainly can't do everything. Nor should we. Nor should we feel guilty when we can't. May we reflect together on what we can give to each other and to the wider community.

Message from the RE Coordinator

Senbazuru - The Thousand Peace Cranes



Senbazuru is a group of one thousand origami paper cranes held together by strings. An ancient Japanese legend promises that anyone who folds a thousand origami cranes will be granted a wish by the gods. Some stories believe you are granted happiness and eternal good luck, instead of just one wish, such as long life or recovery from illness or injury. This makes them popular gifts for special friends and family. The crane in Japan is one of the mystical or holy creatures and is said to live for a thousand years. That is why 1000 cranes are made, one for each year.

In some stories it is believed that the 1000 cranes must be completed within one year and they must all be made by the person who is to make the wish at the end.

A thousand paper cranes are often given to a person who is often seriously ill, to wish for their recovery. They are often created by friends/colleagues as a collective effort. Cranes are symbol of peace, and thus often seen at places like war memorials or atomic bomb memorials.

The one thousand origami cranes were popularized through the story of Sadako Sasaki, a Japanese girl who was two years old when she was exposed to radiation from the atomic bombing of Hiroshima during World War II. Sasaki soon developed leukemia and, at age 12 after spending a significant amount of time in a hospital, began making origami cranes with the goal of making one thousand, inspired by the senbazuru legend. There is a statue of Sadako holding a crane in Hiroshima Peace Park, and every year on Obon day, people leave cranes at the statue in memory of the departed spirits of their ancestors. 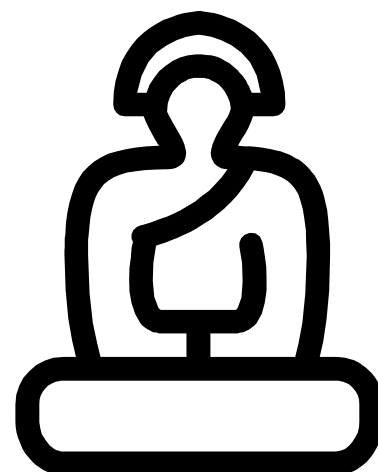

The second installment in our gender-bender series is this costume drama star vehicle for Greta Garbo as the 17th century sovereign of Sweden. For Hollywood purposes the historical facts of her reign were not much observed, but one that remained intact for this 1933 pre-Production Code film is her penchant for cross-dressing as a man. This habit, as well as suspected relationships with both men and women, and other unconventional modes of behavior, resulted in much scandal in her day, and continues to fuel debate among historians about her sexual orientation. The surprising degree to which any of this could be suggested in a Hollywood film attests to the changes in production standards imposed only the year after it was released. For her part, Garbo insisted on casting the marginalized silent film star John Gilbert (with whom she was connected romantically in real life) as her leading man. 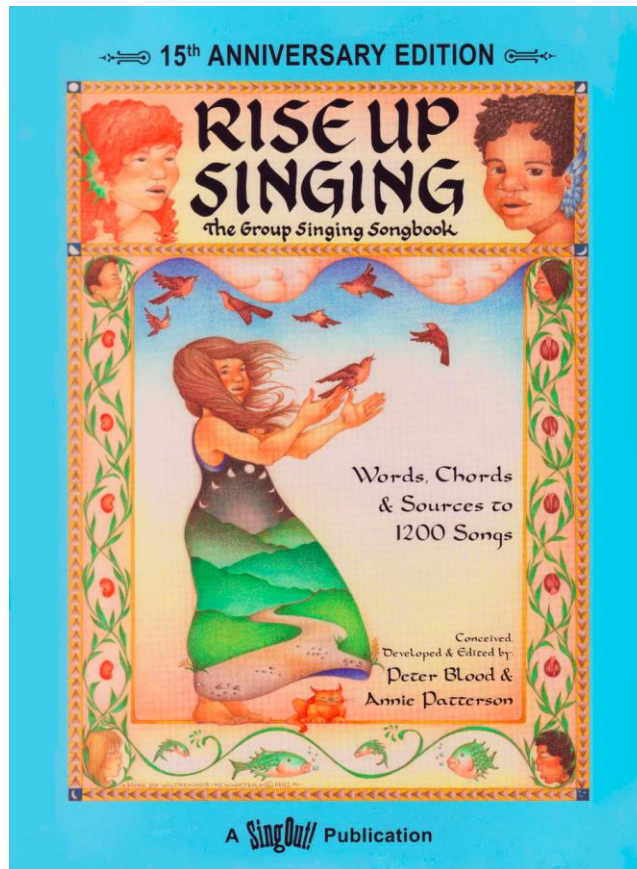

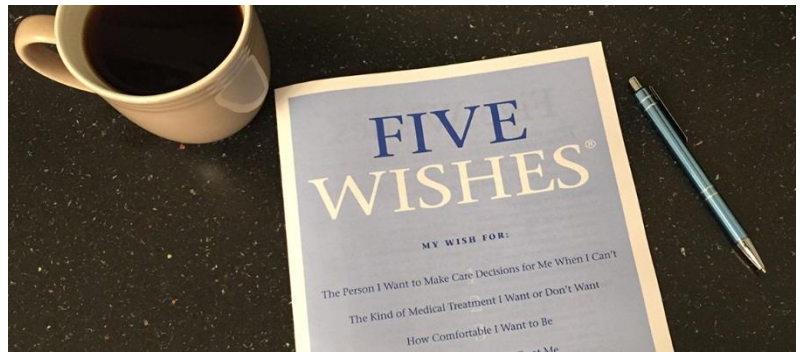

FIVE WISHES WORKSHOP AT SENIOR CENTER

On Wednesday, October 24 at 10:30 AM at the Santa Paula Senior Center, our Caring Committee is sponsoring, and Rev. Maddie will present a workshop open to all on planning for the end of life using the outstanding document, *Five Wishes*. This document is an easy to use legal document written in everyday language that lets adults of all ages plan how they want to be cared for most popular living will with more than 14 million just come on the day.

Five Wishes helps you express how you want to be treated if you are seriously ill and unable to speak for yourself. It is unique among all other living will and health agent forms because it speaks to all a person's needs: medical, personal, emotional and spiritual. *Five Wishes* also helps structure discussions with your family and physician. It is also a great tool to focus discussions with aging relatives so that you know their wishes.

Five Wishes is a legal document in California. There are only eight states remaining in which *Five Wishes* does not yet meet the legal requirements. These states either require a specific state form or that the person completing an advance directive be given a mandatory notice or “warning.” Residents of these states can still use *Five Wishes* to put their wishes in writing and communicate their wishes with their family and physician. Most health care professionals understand they have a duty to listen to the wishes of their patients no matter how they are expressed.
