Message from the Minister

The season is upon us and once more the bells and whistles of consumerism are rampant in the land, along with the light of hope and the waiting for something new to be born into our lives, as of old. Our theme this month is “Hope.” I recently read a piece on the compulsive consumerism that has come to dominate modern life, according to a study done by UNICEF UK, but certainly could have been done in our country as well. One mother reported that she thought her three-year-old son would be bullied if he didn’t have the latest games system at home. The study comments that parents are putting long hours into work and giving their children consumer goods as compensation. Apparently, the children interviewed in the study said they would prefer more time with their parents. Sue Palmer, author of *Toxic Childhood* says, “We are probably the most secular society in the world, we do not have the counterbalance of religion.” Although this was written about the United Kingdom, we are quite familiar with its theme and the acquisition of more stuff. This season, I pray that we encourage the giving and receiving of the gifts of love and hope, rather than more stuff. I am hoping that we can give of our time and companionship to our families, our friends, our congregation and those less fortunate in our community. I hope we can consider the varied traditions that have been brought from around the world to this country, and the rich tapestry or patchwork they can weave in during these end of year holidays, bringing meaning to our lives that might last, rather than the latest gadget that loses its interest or batteries that burn out.

There are many traditions to choose from during the month, from Gathering on December 12th, thoughts on Hanukkah on December 17th, A Winter Solstice Singing Ritual on December 21st and our candlelit Christmas Eve. Read this newsletter for many suggestions. Or perhaps it is quiet that you seek, and you may wish to join me on December 13th at 6:00 PM for Meditation. Whatever traditions you and your family celebrate, I wish you the joyous birth of new meaning in your life and a measure of peace and goodwill.

Famous UUs in History



Elizabeth Blackwell was a social activist and Episcopalian/Unitarian who lived from 1821 until 1910. Her family emigrated from England to America when she was 11, and the entire family was involved in social justice work as part of their liberal religious practice.

While the family was involved in the abolition movement (including Elizabeth), she decided to attend medical school, an unheard-of thing for a young lady to do in the mid-19th century. After finding a medical school willing to let her attend, she graduated from Geneva Medical School in New York in 1849, and she was the first woman in the modern age to do so at this or any other medical school. She practiced medicine and wrote medical books aimed at women's health and parenting throughout her career. As a pioneer in the field of healthcare for women, she broke barriers and open the field to the many women who have since become doctors.

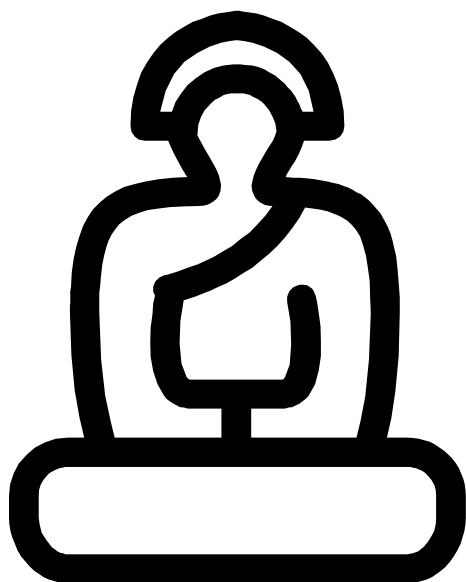

T'AI CHI CHIH

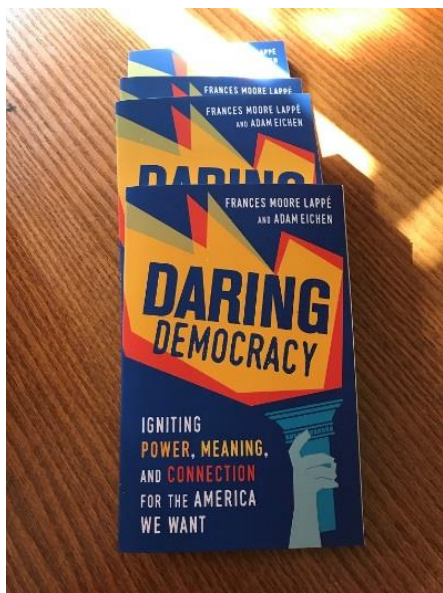

FIRST SUNDAY PLATE OFFERING and LAST SUNDAY OF EACH MONTH

For the 4th Quarter of 2017, our First Sunday Plate and Last Sunday of each month food collection will be the same recipient, CASP: Community Assistance Santa Paula. CASP, a non-profit organization, provides a Food Pantry to serve the disadvantaged of Santa Paula. Being a community charity, CASP's Food Pantry program is largely dependent on the generosity of its citizens.

- The First Sunday Plate offering for October, November and December will be a monetary donation.
- The Last Sunday of these months we collect canned goods, rice and beans and other non-perishable food.

GUEST AT YOUR TABLE BOXES

Each year we participate in the annual Guest at Your Table intergenerational program of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) which raises support for and awareness about the work to advance human rights. This year's program theme is Small Change is Big Change, recognizing that each of us can make big changes in our community and the world. Each day families and individuals can put change in the boxes imagining a guest visiting their table. Checks may also be written to the UUSC. The boxes were passed out during the service on November 19 and will be collected on January 14. Extra boxes and donation envelopes are on the table in the Parish Hall.

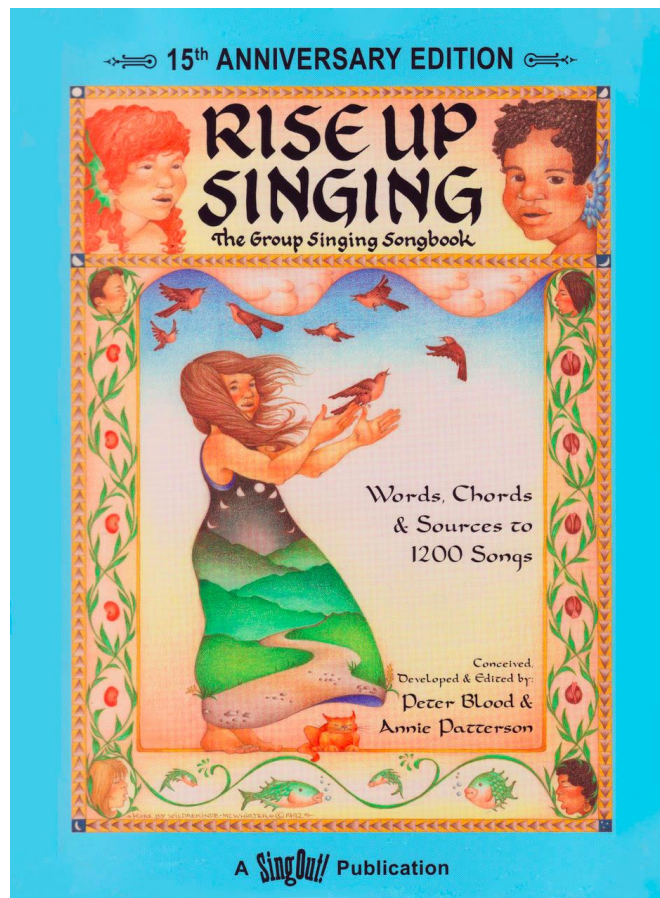
