OFFICE HOURS AND PASTORAL COVERAGE



4th QUARTER FIRST SUNDAY PLATE OFFERING

Our 4th Quarter First Sunday Offering recipient will be the One Stop Shower Program for the homeless, at El Buen Pastor Methodist Church, which is held in the parking lot of the church every Friday morning. In addition to the monetary offering that we collect the first Sunday of October, November and December, we are collecting donations of men's underwear and socks. There is a basket in the Parish Hall for the collection of these donations.

LAST SUNDAY OF EACH MONTH

The Last Sunday of each month we collect canned goods, rice and beans and other non-perishable food for CASP: Community Assistance Santa Paula. CASP, a non-profit organization, provides a Food Pantry to serve the disadvantaged of Santa Paula. Being a community charity, CASP's Food Pantry program is largely dependent on the generosity of its citizens.




Stanley Kubrick labored for nearly four years in making 2001: A SPACE ODYSSEY, solving technical problems involving sets, casting, costuming, sound, and music, and creating industry-altering production values that would have defeated a less meticulous and determined filmmaker.

The result is not so much a genre film than a modern film that trusts the audience to apply their imaginations to what they are seeing. Like an abstract painter, Kubrick gives us only the sparest of brushstrokes, knowing that the artist's most useful pallet is the mind of the viewer.

In making a film that did not try to explain itself, Kubrick got well ahead of audiences and critics in 1968. The film was panned critically, and a flop commercially when it was first released. MGM was on the verge of pulling the film from theaters when it began to find younger audiences attracted to some of its more psychedelic elements. They too were perhaps missing the point, but the renewed interest saved the film from an even worse fate. Fifty years later we can see Kubrick's vision has been fully vindicated, and that alone qualifies it as true masterwork.

This source supports the work of farmers in the Ramallah area who are prohibited from selling their oil in neighboring Israel or Jordan. This olive oil is "characterized by its distinct personality, robust aroma, and a flavor evocative of fresh fruit. It has a peppery bite and a hint of bitterness [a desirable trait] that disappears as the oil ages over time. Once you have tried olive oil from Palestine, most other olive oils appear bland by comparison." See Audrey Vincent to place your order.
