I have been a user of Social Media since about 2009. So it is that Facebook each morning presents me with something called "On This Day" that has copies of photos and words I posted on the particular date going back to 2009. So it is that this morning as I write this, I was presented with a photograph of my mailbox at my old home in Wayland from 2009 with a foot of snow on it. It was a visible indication of how different my life has become in the last year. Although my heat goes on each morning in my house in Santa Paula, it warms up to coatless weather by afternoon. Instead of snow piling on the driveway that needed to be shoveled, I worry about the predicted El Niño rains pouring down Ninth Street next to my house and driving on rain slicked highways. We humans prepare for and adapt to the changes. Here at church sandbags were put strategically to protect our lower story and we keep an eye on the roof of our historic building. We plan for needed upkeep and make decisions about the budget that allow us to have staff and programs to accomplish what we want to do as a congregation and in Santa Paula.

As we continue through our church year, I am mindful of the whole range of what we do here together, from worship to socializing to lifelong learning. I am aware of how we need always to be asking the right questions, whether in how we plan for the future or even in how we get up in the morning and decide which foot to put forward as we greet the new day. Edith Hunter, a 20th Century Unitarian educator once said, "Isn't half the job of becoming educated learning to ask the right questions?" This last year has been a year of asking questions for me. It has been a year of making decisions about what my priorities could and should be and how to optimize what we have to offer here and not burn our members and friends—or myself—out. As my friend and colleague the Reverend MaryLouise Schmalz said in her Charge to the Congregation at my Installation in October, if we each bring our notes, we can make a great symphony together. And we need all the notes—the full sustaining ones that are the root and the little grace notes which bring new life. Which note are you?

Reverend Dr. Rebecca Parker, who was the President of our UU seminary, Starr King Theological School, wrote in a poem, "Benediction": "You must answer this question: what will you do with your gifts? Choose to bless the world." I hope to see you at Sunday worship, our various education and social activities or any of the times and places where we can ask the right questions and choose to bless the world.

Santa Paula Concert Series

Rev. Maddie is forming a committee to support the newly reformed Santa Paula Concert Series. We held three successful concerts in 2015. As we head into 2016, we have five concerts booked, with the next concert on Saturday, February 13 at 7 PM featuring our friend and sometime Sunday pianist Geno Palilla in a program of piano music for Valentine's Day (see flyer elsewhere in this newsletter). The second concert in 2016 will be Saturday, March 5 at 7 PM and feature A Call 2 Peace. A Call 2 Peace multimedia events, is a concert series started in 2002 with the purpose of utilizing the avenue of music and visual arts, to bring forth a simple message about Peace, being that Peace is the responsibility of the individual. During its first chapter, A Call 2 Peace organized presentations in Japan, Uruguay, France, Denmark, Switzerland and the USA and teamed up with many humanitarian organizations, such as UNICEF, Oxfam, the Hunger Project, Handicap International, the Water, Air & Food Awards (WAFA), Echo Valley Hope, Permaculture and many others. It's Valentine's Day cheap date night again at the SPCS, the time we set aside for breezy classic romantic comedies. The selection this year is "Ninotchka," from 1939, starring Greta Garbo and Melvin Douglas, directed by the king of suave, Ernst Lubitsch.

Who made a larger impact on movie culture than Greta Garbo from so few films? In her penultimate effort, Garbo takes on comedy for the first time in her brief career, which ended just one film later—after which the famously shy Garbo never performed anywhere again. Yet the less she was seen, the more the Garbo legend grew, and not without good reason. MGM wisely marketed this film with the tagline "Garbo Laughs," which audiences would have understood as a reference to her first talkie in 1930, then billed as "Garbo Talks" —at the same time inviting them to forget that this film did not actually feature Garbo's first screen laugh! Still it was a genuine novelty, given her reputation for being cast in brooding roles.

The film's piffle of a storyline with plot elements involving comic communists in Paris was almost instantly dated by the outbreak of World War II, but in the hands of Lubitsch, none of that mattered much then, and matters even less now. This is a farce with not a hair out of place, a pure Hollywood comedy in the best sense of the term. And yes, Garbo laughs!
