Message from the Minister


Our theme for the month of March this year is "Truth." You may know that Unitarian Universalists have Seven Principles we covenant and affirm. The Fourth Principle is "A free and responsible search for truth and meaning." Back East where I moved from, many of our buildings of worship are called Meeting Houses, harking back to the day when the congregation met in it but so did Town Meeting and more. Rev. Kenneth Patton, creator of much liturgy in our grey hymnal and of numerous writings on our living tradition, once said of a UU meeting house as "…a house of truth-seeking, where scientists can encourage devotion to their quest, where mystics can abide in a community of seekers." Scientists and mystics stirring the pot of truth together. None of us has the corner on Truth here. In our community, we share our truths with each other. We will be exploring facets of our truths in March, yours and mine. In this day of fake news, it seems important to remember this observation from Danish physicist Niels Bohr who said, "The opposite of a correct statement in a false statement. But the opposite of a profound truth may well be another profound truth." Is there a hard and fast Truth with a capital "T"? Some might think so but for us, revelation is ongoing.

Judgement in Santa Paula



ALL CHURCH READ: JUSTICE ON EARTH

Our All Church Read of 2019 will be *Justice on Earth: People of Faith Working at the Intersections of Race, Class and the Environment.* At a time when racial justice, environmental justice, and economic justice are seen as issues competing for time, attention, and resources, *Justice on Earth* explores the ways in which the three are intertwined. People and communities on the margins are invariably those most affected by climate disaster and environmental toxins. The book asks us to recognize that our faith calls us to long-haul work for justice for our human kin, for the Earth and for all life. It invites us to look at our current challenges through a variety of different perspectives, offers tools to equip us for sustained engagement, and proposes multiple pathways for follow-up action. What Is A Chalice?

The UUA defines our chalice thusly: "A flame within a chalice (a cup with a stem and foot) is a primary symbol of the Unitarian Universalist faith tradition. Many of our congregations kindle a flaming chalice in gatherings and worships and feature the chalice symbol prominently. (It symbolizes) sacrifice and love...the light of reason, the warmth of community, and the flame of hope."


Upcoming RE Youth Classes



What's the matter with these kids today? That question has probably been asked by adults since the dawn of time, so it's a wonder it took so long for it to be addressed in the movies. A few takes on this theme were made in the 1930s, but it wasn't until the late 1940s that juvenile delinquency developed into an identifiable filmmaking genre. It emerged at the same time film noir began delivering cynical stories of crime, deceit, and general moral turpitude. While delinguency films often overlapped stylistically and can be seen as a subset of noir, they were really responding to something quite different: angst over the rise of the postwar youth culture. Two of the more famous of these kids-gone-bad films "The Wild One" (1953) and "Rebel Without a Cause" (1955) were career-makers for real-life "bad boy" actors Marlon Brando and James Dean. The first of our two-film juvenile delinquency miniseries is the 1956 film "Crime in the Streets," first produced for TV directed by Sidney Lumet from a Reginald Rose teleplay. Don Siegel (on the heals of his success with "Invasion of the Body Snatchers") was tasked with adapting the hour-long TV version to a theatrical-length film. John Cassavetes and Mark Rydell were carried over in the cast and James Whitmore and Sal Mineo added. The resulting film shows its TV roots, coming off a bit stagey (and not just a little bit earnest), but Cassavetes, in his first major film role, carries it with a performance of real substance, as surely as those better-known delinquents, Brando and Dean. To be followed in April by "West Side Story," the film that treated juvenile delinquency as high concept. (1:31)



This olive oil is "characterized by its distinct personality, robust aroma, and a flavor evocative of fresh fruit. It has a peppery bite and a hint of bitterness [a desirable trait] that disappears as the oil ages over time. Once you have tried olive oil from Palestine, most other olive oils appear bland by comparison."

What do we want Unitarian Universalism to be? It is a time when we are asking big questions in our faith, and GA 2019 will be focused on digging into those questions together.
