Message from the RE Coordinator

The Roots of Earth Day (from www.earthday.org)



The idea for a national day to focus on the environment came to Earth Day founder Gaylord Nelson, then a U.S. Senator from Wisconsin, after witnessing the ravages of the 1969 massive oil spill in Santa Barbara, California. Inspired by the student anti-war movement, he realized that if he could infuse that energy with an emerging public consciousness about air and water pollution, it would force environmental protection onto the national political agenda. Senator Nelson announced the idea for a “national teach-in on the environment” to the national media; persuaded Pete McCloskey, a conservation-minded Republican Congressman, to serve as his co-chair; and recruited Denis Hayes from Harvard as national coordinator. Hayes built a national staff of 85 to promote events across the land. April 22, falling between Spring Break and Final Exams, was selected as the date.

On April 22, 1970, 20 million Americans took to the streets, parks, and auditoriums to demonstrate for a healthy, sustainable environment in massive coast-to-coast rallies. Thousands of colleges and universities organized protests against the deterioration of the environment. Groups that had been fighting against oil spills, polluting factories and power plants, raw sewage, toxic dumps, pesticides, freeways, the loss of wilderness, and the extinction of wildlife suddenly realized they shared common values.

Earth Day 1970 achieved a rare political alignment, enlisting support from Republicans and Democrats, rich and poor, city slickers and farmers, tycoons and labor leaders. By the end of that year, the first Earth Day had led to the creation of the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the passage of the Clean Air, Clean Water, and Endangered Species Acts. “It was a gamble,” Gaylord recalled, “but it worked.”

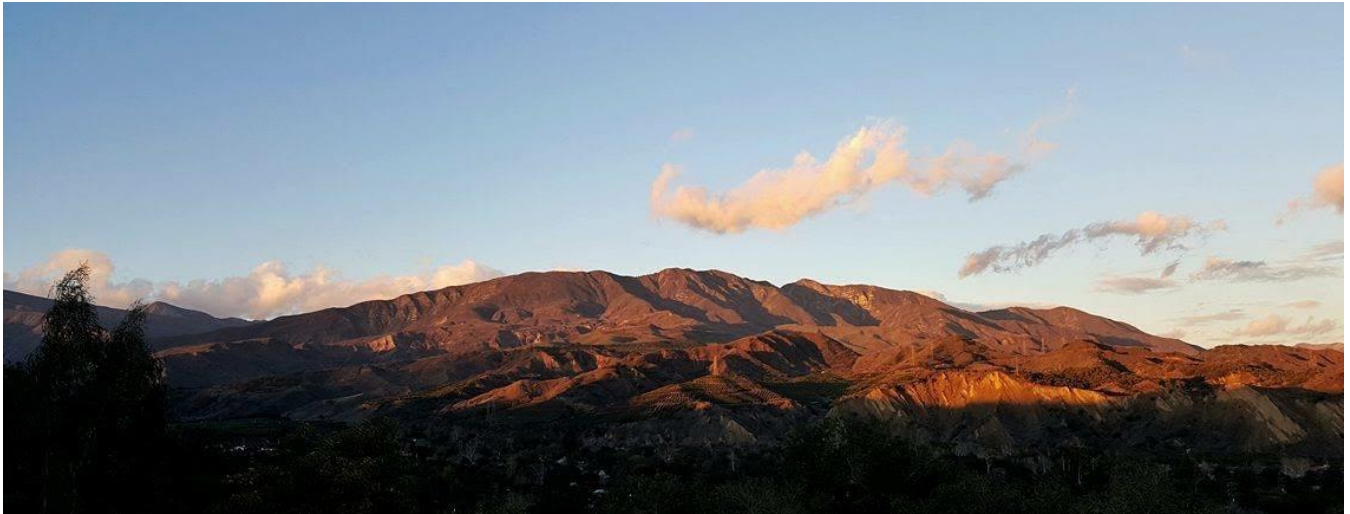
Upcoming RE Youth Classes

- ❖ The 2nd Quarter First Sunday Recipient is The Canine Adoption and Rescue League (C.A.R.L.)
- ❖ Canine Adoption and Rescue League (C.A.R.L.) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit all breed, no-kill dog rescue and adoption organization. Since 1996, C.A.R.L. has rescued and placed thousands of unwanted, sick, abandoned, and homeless dogs. Dogs in our adoption program are placed in pre-screened, loving and secure homes. We make a lifetime commitment to all of our dogs.
- ❖ C.A.R.L. is located in Santa Paula, California and primarily serves Ventura County dogs. Because of our lifetime commitment to our dogs we have a preference to place dogs locally, so we are available to them if needed. We rely on donations and do not receive government, state, or city funding. We operate almost entirely by volunteers.
- ❖ C.A.R.L. has established “CARL’s Golden Oldies”, a new rescue program focusing specifically on the unique needs of dogs aged 10 and older. Senior dogs have so much to give. They are calm and patient, affectionate and loyal. All they ask in return is the same love and care deserving of any pet and a warm place to rest their head.
- ❖ These animals deserve to spend their remaining time in safe, loving, and secure homes. Those homes will be enriched and brightened by the presence of a loyal companion, one who is often already house trained, calm, and used to the company of people and other pets. Senior citizens who could not otherwise afford the medical bills of a senior dog are encouraged to foster these dogs.
- ❖ C.A.R.L.’s Golden Oldies program funding has run out and they are currently seeking help to keep maintaining medical care for the older dogs in the program as well as roofs to keep the dogs dry when it rains. Currently their roofs are in dis-array and they have a quote to fix these but are still about \$10,000 short. Anything you can do to help would be amazing

CASP, a non-profit organization, provides a Food Pantry to serve the disadvantaged of Santa Paula. CABIN IN THE SKY

If a major studio film cast a black star in the 1940s, it was almost invariably in a minor or supporting role. White audiences might also accept the appearance of black performers in musical numbers, provided they played secondary to the white stars. Otherwise, they were relegated to "race pictures," a thriving side industry churning out B-movies for the era's segregated audiences. Would a big-budget film cast entirely with black stars be accepted in 1940s America? The hit stage musical "Cabin in the Sky" provided an opportunity for MGM to explore that concept. The 1943 film of this good vs. evil fable reprised the Broadway performances of Ethel Waters and Rex Ingram, casting with them Eddie "Rochester" Anderson, Butterfly McQueen, Lena Horne, Duke Ellington, and Louis Armstrong, with Vincente Minelli directing. The screenplay, supposedly approved by the NAACP, is no less cliché-ridden than any other Hollywood film of the era, and not a little painful to viewers today in some respects. Yet this film was an important experiment in the mainstreaming of minorities in popular culture, and very entertaining in its own right. (1:38)

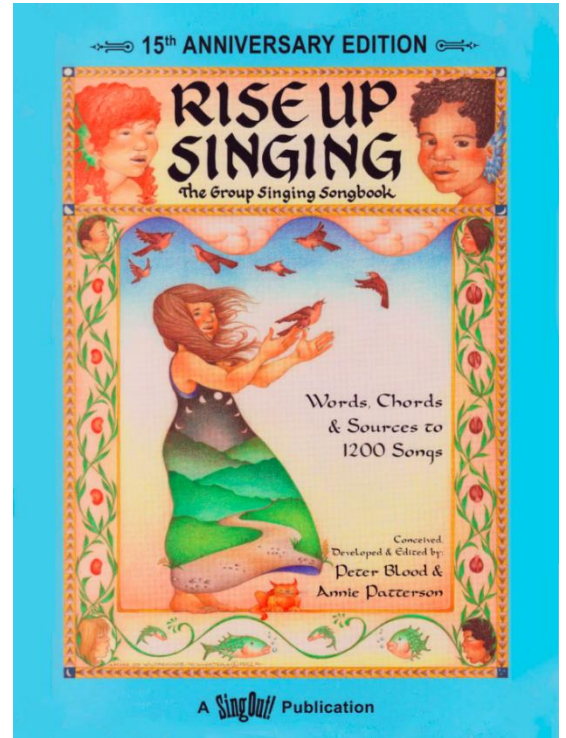
Sign Characteristics:
