


WHAT THE PASTOR IS READING

college. I expect some of her thought to show up in a sermon before too long!


What are you reading?

Message from the Board of Trustees

I am a member of the board of the Santa Paula Art Museum and the UUCSP. I find more similarities between our church and the museums I work with than with other churches. I think we can learn from each other. Currently I am reading a book titled "Magnetic" The Art and Science of Engagement by Anne Bergeron and Both Tuttle. Magnetic describes organizations with a powerful internal alignment and a compelling vision, allowing them to attract critical resources for success. That includes committed and talented people; loyal and engaged audiences, donors and stakeholders; a positive reputation and powerful goodwill; and the financial capital to sustain programmatic excellence and growth. The book is describing museums and presents case histories of successful museums.

As we as a church community move forward into working on our Vision Statement and Mission Statement, I suggest we take lessons from successful museum organizations as well as other churches within and outside our denomination.

ALL CHURCH READ: JUSTICE ON EARTH

Our All Church Read of 2019 will be Justice on Earth: People of Faith Working at the Intersections of Race, Class and the Environment. At a time when racial justice, environmental justice, and economic justice are seen as issues competing for time, attention, and resources, Justice on Earth explores the ways in which the three are intertwined. People and communities on the margins are invariably those most affected by climate disaster and environmental toxins. The book asks us to recognize that our faith calls us to long-haul work for justice for our human kin, for the Earth and for all life. It invites us to look at our current challenges through a variety of different perspectives, offers tools to equip us for sustained engagement, and proposes multiple pathways for follow-up action. 
LAST SUNDAY OF EACH MONTH

Being a community charity, CASP's Food Pantry program is largely dependent on the generosity of its citizens.

CRUISE NIGHT IS BACK!

The first Santa Paula Cruise Night of 2019 is Friday, April 5. Rev. Maddie and Ken Stock will be hosting, offering tours of our Historic Church, including ringing the bell. We can always use some co-hosts! We have a table under a pop up tent in front of the church, passersby, talking greeting about our congregation and its programs and having literature available. We are usually there from about 5 PM until sundown. Cruise Night is held on the first Friday of each month from April through October.





The second in our two-film juvenile delinquency miniseries is the stunning 1961 adaptation of the Tony Award-winning 1957 Broadway stage musical "West Side Story." The original book by Arthur Laurents, loosely based on "Romeo and Juliet," was animated by the music of Leonard Bernstein and Stephen Sondheim, and choreography by Jerome Robbins. The result was one part familiar literature, one part stylish postwar modernism, and one part old-fashioned musical, with the added attraction of being topical (youth problems having become a cultural obsession). For the film, co-directors Robbins and Robert Wise were faced with the basic issue of stage material often not taking well to the screen. The bold choice of using outdoor New York City filming locations was key to opening it up. Though many of the supporting stage players were carried over, all of the major roles were recast. The part of Maria went to Natalie Wood only after it was decided that Carol Lawerence, who originated the role on Broadway, was too old to recreate it on film. The part of Tony went to virtual unknown Richard Beymer when many other more well-known actors (including Warren Beatty, Robert Redford, Tab Hunter, Burt Reynolds, and Elvis Presley!) were either passed over for the part or turned it down. Despite some risky (questionable, even) casting choices, the film did not disappoint on any level. An enormous hit, it equalled if not exceeded its source material, winning ten Academy Awards, and that's still a record for a musical. (2:32)



PALESTINIAN OLIVE OIL bottles are available for a mere \$16 each. We order from a fair-trade source supplying organic extra virgin olive oil grown in Palestine. This source supports the work of farmers in the Ramallah area who are prohibited from selling their oil in neighboring Israel or Jordan. This olive oil is "characterized by its distinct personality, robust aroma, and a flavor evocative of fresh fruit. It has a peppery bite and a hint of bitterness [a desirable trait] that disappears as the oil ages over time. Once you have tried olive oil from Palestine, most other olive oils appear bland by comparison."

The Spokane region is the gateway for adventure and exploration in the Intermountain Northwest. Located driving distance from Glacier National Park and Yellowstone, Spokane is nestled in natural beauty.

Spokane is located on interstate I-90, 110 miles from the Canadian border and 18 miles from Idaho. It is the largest city between Seattle and Minneapolis.

Spokane International Airport (GEG) is serviced by Alaska, American, Delta, Frontier, Southwest, and United Airlines. Nonstop service is offered to 17 destinations, including Minneapolis, Chicago, Dallas, Phoenix, and LAX.

Spokane is accessible by rail via Amtrak's Empire Builder route (Chicago - St. Paul/Minneapolis - Spokane - Portland/Seattle). It is also reachable by Greyhound Bus.
