Message from the Minister



We are beginning a Mission and Vision venture as a congregation, a process that kicked off at Annual Meeting in January and continued at the Board Retreat in April. I hope to have one Board member and several others who I can brainstorm with and put a plan in place that will social events and ways for us to talk with each other about our hopes and dreams for this place.

KEY POLICY AND BUILDING/GROUNDS SECURITY POLICY
Did you know that we have a key policy? If you have church building and
gate keys, do you know that there are policies you must follow? Do you know
that we have recently found gates and doors unlocked after the Month of
Sundays board members have secured the building? Everyone with keys, please read this:



There are separate keys for the building, gates and minister's office. The office administrator, maintains and monitors the key book of all individuals who have keys and updates the book annually. Individuals who no longer meet the eligibility requirement will return keys to the office administrator.

Key holders agree to keep the key(s) in their possession for their use only. No reproduction is allowed.

If key holders have entrance keys, they take responsibility to make sure the church doors are securely locked at the time of departure if they are the last to leave the building.

Eligible for Keys

Church staff, board members, committee chairs, contractors, individuals using the church building for weddings, unions or special events, wedding coordinator or others upon request and approval of the minister or office administrator.

CLASSIC MOVIE NIGHT


This month we revisit the great American screwball comedy with one of the best from writer/director Preston Sturges, the acknowledged master of the genre. Tom and Gerry (Joel McCrea and Claudette Colbert, the personified cartoon cat and mouse) are a flat broke and squabbling married couple. She decides to head off to Florida to cross at least that one item off their list of problems. With Tom giving chase, on the train Gerry meets John D. Hackensacker III (Rudy Vallee), who we can guess by his name is fantastically rich, and prepared to spare no expense in courting her. His sister, the manhunting Princess Centimillia (Mary Astor) goes after Tom, naturally, even though her former paramour Toto (Sig Arno) remains in dogged if bizarre pursuit. And what language does Toto speak, exactly? Follow all of this so far? Because from here on, it gets more complicated. Did we remember to mention Tom and Gerry's unexpected benefactor, the Wienie King?

Working here in his prime, Sturges jams the pedal to the metal in the first frames of this film and never lets up, unleashing a steady barrage of the lighting banter, goofy characters, and impossible situations that were his stock and trade. It's a complete nonsense from start to finish, but with the added Sturges satirical edge that separated him from the lesser screwballers of the era. But don't try to make too much sense of this film, it will only spoil the fun – and what great fun it is! Also featuring Franklin Pangborn and William Demarest, among many other Sturges favorites. Neets! (1942, 1:28)



Mystery Synopsis...

The Devonshire Manor is an 18th century mansion on the outskirts of the town of Pinehorn. It was once owned by the wealthy Devonshire family and is a legendary estate to the citizens of Pinehorn. In their day, the Devonshires were beloved, treated as royalty, as they owned more than half of the businesses in town. The Devonshire Manor has exquisite architectural features, albeit weathered throughout the years. Weeds and high grass have long since replaced the flowering shrubs and ornamental trees that adorned the property in its day. The remaining Devonshire lineage passed away in the early 1900's, leaving their estate in the hands of the town of Pinehorn. The townspeople have neglected to keep up with the place, mostly due to the legend that the Devonshires still roam the corridors at night. The mayor of Pinehorn has made it her quest to remodel and reinstate the Devonshire Manor as a historical bed and breakfast. She believes that the old estate can generate tourism and an income for the town of Pinehorn. Most of the townspeople stand behind her, although a few people are adamantly against her pursuit — stating that the place is haunted and should be left alone. The mayor cleaned up the dusty cobwebs and is hosting a fundraiser bash for the townspeople of Pinehorn. She hopes to raise enough funds for her remodeling endeavors. Spokane

The Spokane region is the gateway for adventure and exploration in the Intermountain Northwest. Located driving distance from Glacier National Park and Yellowstone, Spokane is nestled in natural beauty.

Spokane is located on interstate I-90, 110 miles from the Canadian border and 18 miles from Idaho. It is the largest city between Seattle and Minneapolis.

Spokane International Airport (GEG) is serviced by Alaska, American, Delta, Frontier, Southwest, and United Airlines. Nonstop service is offered to 17 destinations, including Minneapolis, Chicago, Dallas, Phoenix, and LAX.

Spokane is accessible by rail via Amtrak's Empire Builder route (Chicago - St. Paul/Minneapolis - Spokane - Portland/Seattle). It is also reachable by Greyhound Bus.

GA will offer more than 100 programming selections over the course of five days. This year, in addition to Theme-Based Programming, the schedule will feature Role-Based Track Programming, including time for discussion among attendees, sharing inspiring models and stories, and concrete suggestions for how to further the work or "take it home."
