Message from the Minister

Joseph Meeker writes on "Wisdom Page": "Wisdom is a state of the human mind characterized by profound understanding and deep insight. It is often, but not necessarily, accompanied by extensive formal knowledge. Unschooled people can acquire wisdom, and wise people can be found among carpenters, fishermen, or housewives. Wherever it exists, wisdom shows itself as a perception of the relativity and relationships among things. It is an awareness of wholeness that does not lose sight of particularity or concreteness, or of the intricacies of interrelationships. It is where left and right brain come together in a union of logic and poetry and sensation, and where self-awareness is no longer at odds with awareness of the otherness of the world. Wisdom cannot be confined to a specialized field, nor is it an academic discipline; it is the consciousness of wholeness and integrity that transcends both. Wisdom is complexity understood and relationships accepted."

Our theme for June is Wisdom. How do we each identify where we find wisdom? Perhaps we draw our wisdom from our parents and our grandparents, if we were lucky to be born into good parenting. Perhaps we learn wisdom by watching our children. Perhaps we find it in our Unitarian Universalist tradition, it Seven Principles and Six Sources. While the word wisdom is not used in each of our six sources, all of the sources involve cultivating and acting upon wisdom. Wisdom is the distillation of knowledge and experience. It is a resource that is in short supply when the world needs all the wisdom it can create. Perhaps we learned wisdom from hearing the stories of our rich heritage as UUs, such as the story of the first Flower Communion as envisioned by Norbert Capek during World War II and which we will be sharing in our Sanctuary on June 10th—don't forget to bring a flower or two to share! Perhaps we find wisdom through the cycles of nature and the seasons which we will be marking on January 24th with our Summer Solstice.

Wherever you find your sources of wisdom, we hope you will share them with us in our beloved community, enriching all our lives together. See you in church!

Jane Addams, while not technically a Unitarian or a Universalist (she did attend a Unitarian church in Chicago), was a Presbyterian and Ethical Humanist who lived from 1860 until 1935. She was a social reformer who started Hull House in Chicago (America's most famous settlement house), leader in the women's suffrage movement, role-model for middle-class volunteerism, and co-founder of the American Civil Liberties



Union. Because of all of her work towards these issues, as well as being a well-

known peace advocate, she was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1931, becoming the first American woman to receive the award. As a tireless reformer throughout her life, she is known as the founder of what is now known as the social work profession.



- Canine Adoption and Rescue League (C.A.R.L.) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit all breed, no-kill dog rescue and adoption organization. Since 1996, C.A.R.L. has rescued and placed thousands of unwanted, sick, abandoned, and homeless dogs. Dogs in our adoption program are placed in pre-screened, loving and secure homes. We make a lifetime commitment to all of our dogs.
- ❖ C.A.R.L is located in Santa Paula, California and primarily serves Ventura County dogs. Because of our lifetime commitment to our dogs we have a preference to place dogs locally, so we are available to them if needed. We rely on donations and do not receive government, state, or city funding. We operate almost entirely by volunteers.
- ❖ C.A.R.L. has established "CARL's Golden Oldies", a new rescue program focusing specifically on the unique needs of dogs aged 10 and older. Senior dogs have so much to give. They are calm and patient, affectionate and loyal. All they ask in return is the same love and care deserving of any pet and a warm place to rest their head.
- ❖ These animals deserve to spend their remaining time in safe, loving, and secure homes. Those homes will be enriched and brightened by the presence of a loyal companion, one who is often already house trained, calm, and used to the company of people and other pets. Senior citizens who could not otherwise afford the medical bills of a senior dog are encouraged to foster these dogs.
- C.A.R.L's Golden Oldies program funding has run out and they are currently seeking help to keep maintaining medical care for the older dogs in the program as well as roofs to keep the dogs dry when it rains. Currently their roofs are in dis-array and they have a quote to fix these but are still about \$10,000 short. Anything you can do to help would be amazing



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RISE UP SINGING

Rise Up Singing is taking a two-month break while Rev. Maddie travels to the UU General Assembly and takes Study Leave and Donna Nelson visits her mother back home in Alabama. We will be back together on Friday, August 17th and will continue on the third Friday through the next church year. Please see Rev. Somewhere on the order of ninety percent of all films made during the first five decades of moviemaking are considered lost. Not only was nitrate film stock notoriously combustable and difficult to store, once the commercial value of the films was exhausted, the distributors did not much care whether they were ever returned. The end of the distribution line for many films during the silent era was the remote Yukon gold mining boomtown of Dawson City, where they were screened in a theater that doubled as a recreation hall. When Dawson went bust, so did the theater. Many of the stockpiled reels were burned, and others pitched into the Yukon River. The ones that didn't meet those fates were thrown into a disused swimming pool, covered with dirt, and forgotten-until 1978, when they were unearthed during construction on the site. Bill Morrison's haunting documentary is about more than the rediscovery of these old, lost movies; he treats them as fragments of the past that tell the story of Dawson City, and as the basis for a mesmerizing contemplation of time, decay, and memory. Grown in the Ramallah area by Palestinian farmers who are prohibited from selling their oil in neighboring Israel or Jordan, this oil has a distinct personality, robust aroma, and a flavor evocative of fresh fruit. It has a peppery bite and a hint of bitterness [a desirable trait] that disappears as the oil ages over time. Welcome New Member, Alan Shorb.

Over the past few years, I've enjoyed interviewing new church members and writing a short biography to share in the newsletter in order that we may better get to know one another. Judy Triem

Born in Baltimore, Maryland in 1938, Alan is the son of scientists Mary and Doys Shorb. Mary worked at the University of Maryland and was given a lab and funding that led to the discovery of Vitamin B12. Doys was a helminthologist at the USDA's Beltsville Research Center.

Alan studied physics at Swarthmore College in Pennsylvania. He received his MA in mathematics from Cornell and his PhD from the University of Minnesota. While at Swarthmore, he met his wife Yohko, a Japanese student. They were married in 1960. After completing his PhD in 1968, Alan and his family moved to the west coast where he began teaching mathematics and computer science at the Naval Post Graduate School in Monterey. In the mid-1970s the family moved back to the east coast with their three children. Alan began working on computer modeling, developing software for schools for a consulting company. He spent one year in Saudi Arabia during this time.

In 1985 Alan started his own software business, Micro Dynamics Company, in Wellesley, Massachusetts and his wife began teaching Japanese at Wellesley College. Alan and his wife always wanted to spend time in Japan, so they moved there in 1990 with their daughter. Yohko taught Japanese to exchange students while Alan taught computer science through a branch campus of Southern Illinois University.

Moving back to Groton, Massachusetts in 1998, Yohko retired and Alan worked in software for Fidelity Investments. Yohko died in 2002 and Alan retired. For six months he hiked the Appalachian Trail after being a marathon runner and doing 10k races his entire adult life. Turning to the bicycle in 2005-06, he made an 8,000-mile bike ride, camping along the way, visiting friends and staying in motels. He visited 33 state capitals, ending in North Dakota, then spending one year in Los Angeles with his son.

Ashland, Oregon was Alan's next move where he developed an interest in permaculture, creating an edible forest on his three acres. One quarter was in production, planted in plum trees and heirloom corn. He created a deer-proof boundary around the house and garden, and became part of neighborhood harvest and Food Share.

When in 2014 he "got too old to garden," Alan moved back to California to visit with his grandsons. While living in Goleta, he met his partner to be, Nuri Ronaghy. The two are enjoying their new home in Upper Ojai and traveling together around the country to conferences supporting their political interests in peace, justice and women's rights groups.

Being an Ally for Collective Liberation Interactive Workshop with Chris Crass

While awareness of power, privilege and oppression is growing, the question "what can I do" persists. Using stories from his own experience as a white person coming into consciousness about racism and as a man coming into awareness of sexism, Chris takes people on a journey that many can relate to, yet few speak openly about. He is also the author of Towards Collective Liberation: anti-racist organizing, feminist praxis, and movement building strategy and "Other America": Anti-Racist Resources for White People Taking Action for Black Lives Matter.
