Making a Difference

When you are a teacher or someone that works directly with children and youth, you can only hope that sometimes what you say or teach really gets through and makes an impact on them. I would like to share a comment I received from one of our RE parents (since this article is accessible on the internet, the children's names have been left out to ensure safety for our children).

"I appreciate the activities about different kinds of families. I just finished an anti-bias education class so I'm particularly aware now of how important it is to discuss these topics with young children. Last week after our discussion about families that don't all live together, my child pretended to be a member of various families with her younger brother - a single mother with a young son (with and without a father involved); an older sister and brother on their own, etc. She made up different ages for herself and for her little brother as she described her families to me. In this game, I was her friend and she came over to my house and we had a heart-to-heart about her family and who was in it and where they lived in relation to one another. We also discussed how my husband's parents are divorced and how they love all of us, but they don't live together, and we don't live with them, and this is just one of many ways to be a family. I don't think she ever thought about any of this in this much detail before, and it was nice to have the story we read in RE be a springboard for such great conversations with her. So thanks! I look forward to more great discussions about families this coming Sunday!"

Welcoming Congregation

Maddie would like to call a meeting in late July or August to talk about how we are doing at welcoming our LGBTQ friends and neighbors, how we can get the word out that we are a safe place for teens who may be questioning, and how we are understanding the transgender issues in the news this year. Committee on Congregational Life

Donna Hamer has been a church member since 1984 and is currently serving on the Committee on Congregational Life. This committee was reorganized during the interim service of Kristin Rohm. Kate English, Donna and Audrey Vincent were voted in by the congregation as members of the committee in 2013. At that time the terms of the committee were to be staggered to allow a new member to be voted in from time to time. Rev. Maddie has requested that Kate, Donna and Audrey all remain on the committee to assist her during her initial service as minister.

Our Bylaws state that this committee shall meet annually, and more often as needed, to review the congregation's ministry in areas of worship, outreach and marketing, and prepare a report to be shared with the congregation at its annual general meeting. The committee is charged to respond in a timely manner to any conflicts, expressed attitudes, or real activities that might have an adverse effect on the congregation's ministry. The duties and responsibilities of the committee will be highlighted in future newsletters, along with information about each of its members.

Donna is the current acting chair of the committee. She joined the church when she lived in Fillmore. Her children, Daniel and David Moore, were dedicated in the church in 1987 and 1989, respectively. While her membership has endured for the last 32 years, her active participation in the church diminished during the time she lived in Ventura following her divorce, from 1989 to 2010. In 2010, Donna returned to Fillmore for two years and then settled in Santa Paula in 2012. She worked first as a legal secretary and then paralegal from 1989 until she retired in 2015. In addition to membership on the COCL, Donna serves on the Worship Committee and is a Trustee of the Marjorie Newlin Learning Capital Fund.

Save Your Water!

As is our tradition, we will be kicking off the Fall with a Water Communion, a Gathering of the Waters, on Sunday, September 11 led by Rev. Maddie. We ask that you bring a small amount of water from whatever source is meaningful to you, either from the environs of Santa Paula or from your summer travels. The combined water from our shared sources will be used in part to water some of our thirsty plants here on the Church grounds and sterilized for use in any future Baby Dedications.

All Church Read – Get Reading for July 24th!

We will ultimately not be judged by our technology, we won't be judged by our design, we won't be judged by our intellect and reason. Ultimately, you judge the character of a society . . . by how they treat the poor, the condemned, the incarcerated. – Bryan Stevenson

A Common Read invites participants to read and discuss the same book in a given period of time. A Common Read can build community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared experience, shared language, and a basis for deep, meaningful conversations. Each year's Common Read is chosen by a committee including both headquarters and field staff of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). We are planning to discuss it after Coffee Hour on Sunday, July 24. There are two copies of the book on the shelves in the Parish Hall. If you want your own copy, it is available at the regular outlets and the UUA Bookstore which you can access online from www.uua.org.

Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption by Bryan Stevenson (2014, Spiegel & Grau, an imprint of Random House) is this year's selection. Stevenson, founder of the Equal Justice Initiative, has dedicated his legal career to defending those who are trapped by an often capricious, political, and willfully unjust criminal justice system - poor people, people of color, children, and others over whom the system has run roughshod. It speaks to justice, mercy, and compassion, themes of concern to us as Unitarian Universalists and as human beings. It follows on our recent All Church Read, *The New Jim Crow*.

Hindsight, Humor and Hope - HHH

As part of our initiative looking at aging and related issues, Rev. Maddie has been offering two groups of a six-part series, Hindsight, Humor and Hope.
