# Message from the Minister

Minister's column for the September 2018 Newsletter

Here we go again! The world seems geared to beginnings in September. Children go back to school. Families begin to pack up their beach gear. Arts organizations begin their new seasons. And we gather waters from our travels and kick off a new church year. Many of you have been traveling during the summer; others of you have started attending our beloved community for the first time while the travelers were away. I hope you have collected a small portion of water to share in our service on September 9<sup>th</sup> when we will gather as a community of all ages, our choir will sing, and we will pour our water into a common bowl, just as we share our time, talents and treasure with one another.

Our theme for September is "Vocation", suitable for the month in which we mark Labor Day in our Country as a sort of official end to summer. See elsewhere for information about Santa Paula's Labor Day Parade. Last year I talked about Parker Palmer's views on vocation in September and his small but inspiring book, "Let Your Life Speak," which is our quote for this September on the Roadside Pulpit on Main Street. Whether you are still working or retired, how do you think about the work you do or did, paid or unpaid? What calls you?

There are three ways to look at work, according to Brett and Kate Mckay:

A Job. Those who see their work as a job are those who belt out "Everybody's Working for the Weekend" with great gusto. They live for breaks, for vacation. The job is simply a means to the end: a paycheck. They need to support their family/pay their rent, and this is the ticket they punch to do it. The job may not be terrible, but it offers the worker very little real satisfaction.

A Career. The careerist derives meaning not from the nature of the work itself but the gratification that comes from advancing through the ranks and earning promotions and raises. This motivates the careerist to put in extra time; work doesn't necessarily stop when they punch out. However, once this forward progress stops, the careerist becomes unsatisfied and frustrated.

A Vocation/Calling. A vocation is work you do for its own sake; you almost feel like you'd do it even if you didn't get paid. The rewards of wages and prestige are peripheral to getting to use one's passion in a satisfying way. Those in a vocation feel that their work has an effect on the greater good and an impact beyond themselves. They believe that their work truly utilizes their unique gifts and talents. This is what they were *meant to do*.

I know that what I have been doing for decades now is a calling, a vocation. I was called to a musical career, inspired by my musical family and the gift of a voice. I was called to youth work when I discovered Unitarian Universalist in the 1980s. And I was called when I founded an elder chorus in 1988 and directed it for 20 years. And along the way I was called to the ministry. It was certainly not a way to get rich...but it was and is a rich immersion in beloved community. Let us all come back into community and welcome all in our doors.

### COMMITTEE ON CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

According to the Bylaws of the Universalist Unitarian Church of Santa Paula, the Committee on Congregational Life's primary mission to evaluate the overall effectiveness of the congregation's ministry (ordained, staff and laity). The COCL is not a committee of the Board, but a committee of the congregation in special relationship to the Board. It consists of three members serving staggered terms of two years each. Current members are Judy Triem, Audrey Vincent and new member, Ken Stock. COCL meetings are held quarterly in the context of confidentiality and mutual honesty. Members are encouraged to let Rev. Maddie or one of the members of the committee know if there are any issues of the ministry of the congregation of which they should be aware. The next meeting of the COCL will be Thursday, September 13 at 6:00 PM at Rev. Maddie's home.

### **WORSHIP TEAM**

The Sunday morning service or "Worship" is a unifying event in the life of our congregation, a place where members and friends come together for inspiration, intellectual challenge, spiritual nourishment, community belonging, intergenerational connections, and continuity with the Unitarian Universalist faith, and where all other areas of church activity can connect, including music, other arts, religious education, social action, hospitality, and stewardship. This year we are transitioning from a Worship Committee to a Worship Team which will meet quarterly, together with the Minister, to schedule Worship Associates, consider and support any and all aspects of worship services, Sunday mornings, but also special worship services and worship-related events that take place at other times of the week like the Winter Solstice and monthly Gatherings.

All current Worship Associates and anyone interested in becoming one or in the philosophy of worship is cordially encouraged to attend a Worship Team Potluck at Rev. Maddie's home on Monday, September 10 at 6:30 PM. Please be in touch with her to let her know you are coming and so we can coordinate the food.

### **RE TEAM**

As you see elsewhere in this newsletter, we are moving to the team approach rather than committees except those mandated by our Bylaws. In many congregations the work of a Religious Education Committee, what we abbreviate as "RE", has the entire lifespan as its scope and includes programming for the youngest to the oldest. This includes program development, teacher and leader recruitment and publicity for programming. Even in a small congregation like ours, the work of thinking about the lifespan of RE or "faith development" should be more than the job of the minister and the Coordinator of Religious Education. Erik Halseth's job description with its minimal hours focuses on children and youth. So, it is that we are looking to have a RE Team which meets bi-monthly (or more if they choose) to think about our offerings across the lifespan. The hope is to have liaisons from our Board of Trustees, our Caring Committee, our Worship Team and our Social Concerns Action Committee as well as a couple of at large members. ### LABOR DAY PARADE

Santa Paula holds one of the only Labor Day Parades in California. Audrey Vincent has been on its Planning Committee for some years. Labor Day was first held in America on September 5, 1882. Oregon made it an official holiday in 1887. By the time it became a federal holiday in 1894, 30 states were celebrating it as a holiday. The first Labor Day observance in Canada was

in December 1872 by the Toronto Typographical Union as part of their strike for a 58 hour week. It also became formalized in Canada in 1894 as an annual celebration on the first Monday in September. Labor Day becomes more important as unions are weakened and minimum wages in many areas are not living wages. Santa Paula's Parade is always festive and is led off by the Ministerial Association near the front of it all. Come join the fun as it kicks off near the intersection of 7th Street and Main Street at 10 AM on Monday, September 3.



### **CRUISE NIGHT**

The next Santa Paula Cruise Night of 2018 is Friday, September 7. Rev. Maddie and Ken Stock will be hosting, offering tours of our Historic Church, including ringing the bell. # Some Like it Hot

In this landmark gender-bending comedy, Billy Wilder took on the big taboos in American culture and treated them as if they didn't even exist. This bold sleight of hand changed Hollywood forever, demolishing what was left of the strictures of the Production Code that had restrained film content and themes for 25 years. It mattered little that the code office declared the film unsuitable for children on its release in 1959, or that the Catholic Legion of Decency termed it "morally objectionable." What mattered more is the film was received as a comedy masterpiece. It hardly hurt Wilder's cause that he had Marilyn Monroe at the top of the bill (though she proved to be a huge production challenge), and the superb supporting cast of Tony Curtis, Jack Lemmon, George Raft, Pat O'Brien, and Joe E. Brown serving up a razor-sharp screenplay by Wilder and I.A.L Diamond. This is not only one of the greatest film comedies of all time, but one that can also be appreciated for what was accomplished. ### "ZODIAC ZUNDAY":


On September 16 we will be honoring *Virgo* (August 23 - September 22) <u>Sign Characteristics:</u>



**DINNER AND A MOVIE** – *The Waiting Room*, a documentary released by Bullfrog Films, uses extraordinary access to go behind the doors of an American public hospital struggling to care for a community of largely uninsured patients. In the midst of waiting room chaos, we track a compassionate nurse, an anxious father, and a handful of other indelible characters. Instead of hearing about America's broken health care system, we are made to feel, touch and experience it firsthand. **EXPAND-YOUR-MIND** will prepare to discuss the Gaza and the Palestinian-Israeli Conflict by reading the *Failing Peace* by Sara Roy. Our discussion will take place on Sunday, September 16<sup>th</sup> 2:00 pm at a home in Ventura. Call Margaret Wilson or church office for address and information.



This book is the culmination of 20 years of research, fieldwork and analysis on the Palestinian-Israeli conflict, and the impact of Israeli occupation. Discussion of Israeli policy toward Palestinians is often regarded as a taboo subject, with the result that few people -- especially in the U.S. -- understand the origins and consequences of the conflict. Roy's book provides an indispensable context for understanding why the situation remains so intractable. The focus of Roy's work is the Gaza Strip, an area that remains consistently neglected and misunderstood despite its political centrality. Drawing on more than two thousand interviews and extensive first-hand experience, Roy chronicles the impact of Israeli occupation in Palestine over nearly a generation. Exploring the devastating consequences of socio-economic and political decline, this is a unique and powerful account of the reality of life in the West Bank and Gaza. Written by one of the world's foremost scholars of the region, it offers an unrivalled breadth of scholarship and insight.
