Message from the Minister

As we near the end of the regular church year and go into the slower (for some) summer months, as we welcome new members at our Flower Communion on June 9 and make changes in our Faith Formation program (Religious Education) recognizing the two years Erik Halseth served our children as Coordinator of Religious Education, and as we celebrate all our activities that take place in our congregation all week long, it seems like a good time to think of *Ten Reasons to Come on Sunday*, thanks to Touchstones:

One: Life is a puzzle that often eludes our search for a solution. We are a puzzle to our self and others. Our congregation is a place to sort out the pieces, to make some sense of the emerging pattern, and to find the missing pieces.

Two: "Before his death Rabbi Zusya said, 'In the coming world, they will not ask me: 'Why were you not Moses?' They will ask me: 'Why were you not Zusya?'' Our congregation is a place in which you can become more nearly you.

Three: Because we are not self-sufficient, self-sustaining, or self-derived, all of our lives we are in need of others, and others are in need of us. Within our congregation you will find gentle hands and hearts that create and sustain beloved community. Your hands and heart are also welcome in this work.

Four: Albert Schweitzer said, "At times our own light goes out and is rekindled by a spark from another person." Come to have your flame rekindled.

Five: Life is difficult. You might come to our congregation driven by despair. We offer comfort, companionship, and hope.

Six: You might come on out of a sense of profound reverence for the gift of life. Consider making attending a spiritual practice.

Seven: Are you trying to make sense of those things that make it hard to sleep through the night? Within our congregation, the invitation is to engage essential questions; to tell your story and to learn from the stories of others; and to allow your life to become your teacher.

Eight: Life is a high wire act without a net. There is no way forward but forward, and you must risk who you are in service of who you might become. Within our congregation, you will be encouraged and challenged as you travel on your life journey.

Nine: You might come to our congregation without a specific reason except your willingness to place yourself in a place of possibility.




Message from the Minister



VISION, MISSION AND COVENANT

Who are we, as an individual Unitarian Universalist congregation, the Universalist Unitarian Church of Santa Paula? Who are we, when we gather? Who are we, as a religious community?

Vision, mission, and covenant are resources for congregational development and health. Congregations without a compelling and shared vision may too easily lose track of what they should be doing and, consequently, struggle to determine how to allocate their human and financial resources. Without a centralizing agreed-upon focus, battles can rage over competing interests and equally good projects. However, when vision and mission and covenant are in place, all discussion circles back to these articulated statements for a double-check and grounding. So it is that your Board and Rev. Maddie with all of our members and friends are beginning a process of focusing on our Mission which is to "Practice Inclusiveness; Seek Justice and Foster Spirituality". A sermon series on each part of our mission will begin on June 2, continue on July 14 and conclude on September 15, given by Rev. Maddie with a different board member as Worship Host. And we are kicking off a series of small group meetings, one-on-ones, circle dinners and potlucks over the next year or so focusing on who we are and where we are going, including not only Sunday morning but the many other ways we show up in our building at other times of the week and in the larger world. Already in the planning are meetings for existing small groups in the church, with the Worship Team meeting for a potluck on Saturday, July 13 at Noon and the Caring Committee for a potluck on Thursday, September 12 at Noon, both at Rev. Maddie's home.

Needed: a small group to work with Rev. Maddie and Pat English from the Board to coordinate the meetings, hosts for Circle Dinners, help brainstorm the powerful questions that will be asked and compile the results. Please let us know if you are interested. And we hope to make it fun!

FAITH FORMATION TEAM

As we move into the Mission/Vision process of this congregation and the changes to our program for what has been called Religious Education (RE) for the youngest, we are looking at a more integrated philosophy of Faith Formation across the lifespan and what is now being called Family Ministry. It is in its initial planning stages and the more voices the better as we continue to serve our children and youth but in perhaps a different way than we have in recent years—or ever! It is a new world in congregations where over the last several decades, changes in the larger society have affected church attendance for all and the number children in particular. 
NEWS FROM AMONG US JUNE 2019

CLASSIC MOVIE NIGHT


LIKE **FATHER**, LIKE **SON**



Filmmaker Hirokazu Kore-eda has often returned to the theme of family, which over many films he has explored as emotionally complex, darkly secretive, contradictory, and even arbitrary. The Japanese title of this film, among the best in the family drama genre for which is known, apparently doesn't translate easily into English, so the selection of a cliché for the title of its Western release can perhaps be forgiven. The storyline, about two children switched at birth, feels as if it could have been lifted straight from a 19th century potboiler. This might sound like a hopelessly derivative, melodramatic concept, and in the hands of another filmmaker it probably would be, but Kore-eda's laser-like attention to emotional detail reduces plot devices to an afterthought. As in all Kore-eda films, the focus in this one is exploring how people negotiate their situations, in this case, two very different families thrown together by random circumstances. The theme of nature vs. nurture also comes into play, but fades into the background as the more basic human drama plays out, with the insight and empathy to human conditions that Kore-eda brings to all of his films, along with a highly composed filmmaking style that is uniquely and beautifully Japanese. With Masaharu Fukuyama, Machiko Ono, Yôko Maki, Lily Franky, actors who will be familiar to Kore-eda fans-which you may well become yourself after watching this first-rate example of his work. Requires a bit of effort to absorb, but well worth it. (2014, 2:01, Japanese with English subtitles)
