DECEMBER THEME: Compassion

Compassion is a significant part of our second principal. Compassion comes from two Latin roots: com meaning "together" and pati meaning "to suffer." It is part of a continuum that begins with sympathy—feeling pity for—and moves to empathy—feeling with. We are born with a disposition toward compassion, but it is a disposition that must be cultivated and deepened.

December 1 The Practice of Compassion

Compassion is a key element in our second principle, "Justice, equity and compassion in human relations," as well as our second source, "Words and deeds of prophetic people which challenge us to confront powers and structures of evil with justice, compassion, and the transforming power of love." Many who come to Unitarian Universalism do so because they find "like-minded" people, religious liberals in an illiberal world. The bigger challenge of our faith is for us to become "like-hearted." Compassion is an essential element in this faith journey. First Sunday of Advent.

December 8 Back to Junior High

Oncology chaplain and popular guest speaker, Michael Eselun will share some deeply personal reflections about junior high school-- a pivotal and often painful time that leaves indelible memories for many of us. In dialogue with some of those 13-year-old's perceptions, what might be discovered about inherent worth, dignity and compassion? Second Day of Advent

The service this Sunday is an exploration of the season in word and song through African American spirituals including Mary Had a Baby, Children Go Where I Send Thee, Rise Up Shepherd and Follow, and Go Tell It On the Mountain. Tuesday, December 24 at 5 PM Christmas Eve Service

We gather on Christmas Eve for a traditional Christmas Eve service of readings, Carols, and special music. We will end with the traditional candlelit Silent Night.

There is a little Christmas hymn in our hymnal *Singing the Living Tradition* that sings "Let Christmas come, its story told, when days are short and winds are cold; let Christmas come, its lovely song, when evening's soon and night is long." I sometimes wonder how it would be to live in the Southern Hemisphere when the days at Christmas are the longest days of the year and visions of snow and sleigh bells far out of mind, except in the imported songs of Frosty and Rudolph. Whether they too have advertisements about the far away college student returning home in the dark of the early morning through snow and bad weather to brew coffee, with the intoxicating aroma wafting up the stairs to wake his loved ones. But we here inherited the Northern European traditions, and so we look to the holiday lights to brighten these longest nights and some wish for a White Christmas, even if you have to drive to the mountains to find one. At this time of year, we return to the ancient stories of a child born long ago who changed the world and our very own stories of holidays, those that warm us down to our tippy toes and those that shiver our timbers. For those of us with newly smaller families or with friends and family members far flung, may we make new traditions and stories to Welcome Yule. And if we are blessed to have our families gather around us, may we be grateful and not worry about the wrappings and crumbs strewn about or hosting the perfect celebration. Let Christmas Come and let us remember the simplicity of the story of a new birth and new light.



Message from the Minister

In these times it is easy to become discouraged with all the terrible things that are happening to marginalized people, particularly people of color, in our country and the world. We can fall into the trap of feeling that it is hopeless and that there is nothing we can do. I know some of you have heard me quote Edward Everett Hale on this topic many times. But at the risk of being redundant, I would like for you to see the words in print.

Hale, a Unitarian minister in the 19th. Century, was quoted by many people, including Helen Keller, Martin Luther King, Jr, and Barack Obama, in their own ways. But in our UU hymnal, his words are remembered as:

"I am only one, but still I am one.

I cannot do everything, but still I

can do something.

And because I cannot do everything,

I will not refuse to do the something

that I can do."

So, what <u>can</u> we do? It is a question that I hear a lot. And I would like to give you at least some things you and I can do about social justice issues that we hear about. Below you will find some suggestions for how to get involved.

1.Educate yourself about what is really going on by

reading books and articles, going to public forums, and listening to podcasts.

2. Share discussions with knowledgeable groups and individuals at UUCSP and other places.

3. Vote!

4. Write and/or call your state and national legislators when you feel strongly about some issues and join with others to do that regularly.

5. Write strong and reasoned articles and letters to the editor of your local newspaper.

6. Vote!

7. Join public actions to support important justice issues in your community, your county, and your state and work with people who are in need.

8. Donate to organizations that stand for the same things you do and who put their values into action. Some of those Unitarian Universalist organizations would be the UU Service Committee, the UU College of Social Justice, and the UU Justice Ministry of California.

9. Vote!

And if you want more ideas, let's talk! Social Justice is my passion and my salvation.

ANNUAL NOTICE OF MEMBERSHIP REQUIREMENTS FOR THE UNIVERSALIST UNITARIAN CHURCH OF SANTA PAULA

From our Bylaws, Article III – Membership:

- A. Any Person who is in sympathy with the purpose and program of this church may become a member by signing the membership book, subject to acceptance by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees or the members present at any legal meeting of the congregation.
- B. Membership in this church shall be open to all persons 13 years of age or older without regard to race, color, gender, national origin, physical or mental challenges, sexual orientation, or gender identification.
- **C.** Once a person has been accepted as a member, membership rights shall continue as long as s/he indicates, when asked, the intention to continue as a member, and makes identifiable financial or service contributions.

WHAT THE PASTOR IS READING

Somewhere in my travels I picked up the latest book I have been reading, "The Creative Family Manifesto" by Amanda Blake Soule. It has brought back many memories of how I raised my son Nigel, way back to when I was raised as the oldest of four siblings by my parents who were themselves raised by two immigrant families. My parents came of age during the depression and spent their younger years in families struggling to get a toe hold in their new country...which meant that they needed to be creative about their activities and free time in the days before television and the early days even of radio. Day to day creativity wasn't a choice but just a way of living. As we go into the holiday season, I remember how we made our own decorations, from stringing cranberries and

popcorn, making red and gold construction paper chains and gathering greens from the woods to decorate our fireplace mantle and front door. And we rolled our own Christmas cookies from the family recipe, frosting them in red, green and white and decorating them with sprinkles and non-pareils. We made each other presents and our entertainments were putting on plays in the basement with old sheets as the stage curtains and singing Carols in the parlor and the neighborhood. I don't think it is just nostalgia that makes me think that those days were more fun than shopping for decorations at Big Lots. Soule's book is chock full of ideas for how to spend time with your children and grandchildren that make me smile. These days in our consumerist world, it seems darn counter-cultural!





The challenges, the call, and the opportunity of this moment in Unitarian Universalism and in the broader US American society are compelling. Unitarian Universalists must be prepared and willing to look inward, examining, exploring, and acting to dismantle white supremacy culture in our association, in our congregations and groups, and in ourselves. At the same time, we must be prepared and willing to look outward and act to lift up Unitarian Universalist values in the political and civic challenges of our time. Rev. Maddie will be leading a three part workshop this church year based on the former UUA Common Read book: Centering: Navigating Race, Authenticity, and Power in Ministry, edited by Mitra Rahnema (Skinner House, 2017), centers the stories, analysis, and insights of a number of Unitarian Universalist religious leaders of color as they explore how racial identity is made both visible and invisible in Unitarian Universalist communities. She has ordered several copies of the book which are available to borrow, or you can order your own from the UUA Bookstore. The next two meetings will be on January 12, and February 16 after coffee hour in her office.

MESSAGE FROM THE MARJORIE NEWLIN LEAMING CAPITAL FUND

The Fund Trustees are pleased to let you know that the Capital Fund is doing well this year. Even with the withdrawals for the Church, the Fund has risen by \$93,839 to \$1,930,039 in 2019.

Donations to the Fund have been low this year and the Trustees are planning to hold a fundraiser early next year. Donations before the end of 2019 would also be great to receive. The goal is to increase the Capital Fund to above \$2MM which will reduce the annual financial fees and increase the amount the Church can receive for operations and expenses.

The Groundhog Society is a group of people willing to plan and actively contribute to the Church's future by naming the Capital Fund as a beneficiary of their estate plan. Currently the Groundhog Society has 15 members and the Trustees are hoping more will join when Groundhog Day is celebrated at the Church in early February.

Mike Leigh's comedy of bad manners is not so much a movie as a filmed play. Originally developed for the London stage and featuring Leigh's wife Alison Steadman, its highly successful run was forced to an early end when she became pregnant. With no thought of recasting the lead to keep it on the stage, the play was instead immortalized with a serendipitous BBC taping in 1977. The TV broadcast turned this satire of social striving in pre-Thacher Britain into an instant cultural phenomenon, to the degree that "Abigail's Party" entered the British cultural lexicon as shorthand for an awkward social event, where everyone behaves properly and dreadfully at the same time. From the start of his filmmaking for BBC during the 1970s, Mike Leigh developed an unusual collaborative method of scripting and working with his actors, devising the situations and character histories, then allowing the dialog to be improvised, as it was here. As a result much of the character backgrounds are revealed only by implication through smalltalk, an affect that allows us to see his people as having full lives outside the immediate frame of the story. "Abigail's Party" became a touchstone piece in the UK, where it continues to be revived on stage, but this early work of a great filmmaker deserves to be seen here too. (1:42)

GUEST AT YOUR TABLE BOXES: Each year we participate in the annual Guest at Your Table intergenerational program of the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) which raises support for and awareness about their work to advance human rights. This year's program theme is Women Leaders, Strong Communities, recognizing that each of us can make big changes in our community and the world. Each day families and individuals can put change in the boxes imagining a guest visiting their table. Checks may also be written to the UUSC. The boxes will be passed out during the service on November 24 and will be collected in early January. Extra boxes and do nation envelopes will be on the table in the Parish Hall.



\$25 helps women in Kiribati access clean water for their households by supporting the installation of new water tanks.

\$50 supports a research project led by Muslim women about the surveillance of Muslim communities in the United States.

\$75 advances drought recovery in Tanzania by providing livelihood support for one single mother, elderly woman, or woman living with disabilities.



\$100 bolsters women's farming cooperatives in Nicaragua through supporting improved administrative systems and strategic planning.

\$150 helps girls and women from Burma (Myanmar) attend leadership and peace-building trainings focused on bridging ethnic and religious divides within the country.

\$300 supports legal assistance for vulnerable migrant populations applying for asylum at the U.S.-Mexico border, including mothers with young children and pregnant women.

\$500 helps fund psychological support and improved security measures for Honduran women human rights defenders, who are facing threats, harassment, and surveillance.

Our church has a long history of donating food as a tangible expression of our generosity toward the deep need in our community. One Step A La Vez is so grateful to begin receiving the monthly UUCSP non-perishable food collection on the last Sunday of each month. The food will be used for meals for the teens served by our program from Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru. Whatever we are unable to use for the youth, will be distributed in our twice monthly **community food pantry** to hungry families (First and second Wednesdays). We welcome ALL non-perishable food items but some very helpful items that the teens will always go through include, peanut butter, jam, breakfast cereal, canned tuna or chicken, jars of pasta sauce, canned pineapple, boxes of macaroni and cheese or cup o' noodles, granola bars, popcorn, and dry pasta. Shelf stable basics like cooking oil, flour, spices and condiments also help!

We can also always use things like tampons, pads, shampoo conditioner, bodywash, deodorant, toothbrushes, laundry soap for our free **toiletries closet** that is accessed by our staff when a youth needs something they do not have at home. For our **Christmas Store** where the teens go free "shopping" for their siblings, parents, grandparents and anything they might want for themselves. These could be new or used giftable items for ANY age. We never know what youth will participate - it depends on their attendance on the day of the store... so we do not get little cards with specific requests. But One Step for sure can always use anything our congregants might want to donate. Why don't we dedicate the Xmas tree to the One Step Xmas store?

We are accepting donations December 1st- December 18th.

Our Christmas Store happens on December 19th and whatever the teens do not select is then given out to our food pantry families. We help the teens wrap the gifts for their family members and they each go home with a large bag of gifts like Santa.

Usually we tell people that anything they were about to take top the Goodwill they should bring to us instead...
