Message from the Minister

How changed the world is! Each one of us most likely has had to set aside whatever plans we had for 2020 when the new year rolled around. I know that I won't be going to Montana to preach and take some vacation in May, nor will I be going to the UU General Assembly in Providence in June. GA has also moved online...which will give all of you a chance to attend all or part of it. I continue to wish you safety and sanity as we all attempt to navigate this unprecedented situation. I continue to encourage you to look for the bright moments, the quiet when we can hear the birds and the touching base with friends to just see how things are going. I have attended Zoom cocktail hours with colleagues nearby and far and with East Coast friends (soft drinks allowed!). And since I am in the "hope business", as I often call it, I look for those moments of hope that are still in each day. I read a favorite Emily Dickinson poem at a recent online service which begins:

"Hope" is the thing with feathers -

That perches in the soul -

And sings the tune without the words -

And never stops - at all -

In the scriptures, Paul talks about faith, hope and love. These three have been the foundation of the Judeo-Christian world we come from as Unitarian Universalists. This hope is not sentimental nor is it out of touch with reality. It is not a cock-eyed optimist. Rather it is a foundational way we can move through this time, looking at what we have held up as being important that perhaps isn't, after all. For me my hope is for this pandemic to pass as quickly as possible, that the scientists can learn what we need to know to move forward, and that the love we have for each other in this congregation, this community and beyond will hold us and help us to address the needs of our community and those vulnerable among us. And I pray for those who have been touched with illness or death from COVID-19.

For now, Sunday morning worship continues to be online as best we can manage it. We will continue with that until the Center for Disease Control, our area government officials and the Unitarian Universalist Association say that it is safe to gather in person again. For now, we have a Zoom Sanctuary and a Zoom Parish Hall. We have Zoom activities...and could have more if any of you have an idea to share. I continue live-stream our Meditation Group from my house at 6 PM on Wednesdays on our church Facebook page. I prefer to see the bright side to our current situation, seeing people in our Zoom sanctuary who live far away and folks nearer by who cannot join us on Sunday mornings or for other events. Thought will be given to how to continue to include these folks, even as we grapple with copyright issues when you are broadcasting online, Zoom bombers (we've been lucky so far), those among us who don't have the technology or know how to join us and the difficulties many have not seeing each other in person. Our first priority continues to be to stay safe and look out for each other. I am mostly working from home much of this time but both Krystal and I will be in the office some days, social distancing from each other on our different floors. 2nd QUARTER FIRST SUNDAY PLATE OFFERING



We will continue to support this cause on May 3 and June 7 with mailed and electronic donations collected.

For 26 years, Friends of the Santa Clara River (FSCR) has been the voice of protection and conservation of the 82-mile Santa Clara River from its headwaters to the sea. FSCR is currently the steward of the donated keystone property, Hedrick Range Nature Area (HRNA). In the Santa Clara River Valley, FSCR actively restores the riparian (streamside) environment at HRNA. Volunteers come monthly to the 220-acre site to remove invasive plants, plant native vegetation, and work in the native plant nursery. After many years, the restoration has been a huge success as endangered bird species have returned in increasing numbers. Larger land mammals, such as mountain lion and coyote, are known to be present signifying the entire ecosystem is healthy.

Not far upstream FSCR is helping to manage a visitor area known as the Sespe Cienega Trail (at the road into the Fillmore Fish Hatchery). The site is newly open to the public and contains ½ acre interpretive native plant trail. Visitors are able to take a brochure available at the site kiosk and walk through finding numbered markers and reading about important species. Volunteer days to maintain the current trail are held approximately every other month. A significant expansion of the Sespe Cienegea site is planned over the next few years with other conservation partners.

Thanks to State funding FSCR takes school classes -- over 1,500 students learning about the river on-site. Immersion in nature is the best way to impart lasting knowledge and lifelong stewardship of our environment. Before the grant funding expires, FSCR would like to establish a Santa Clara River Scholar Fund to continue offering this program. The fund would cover program expenses, such as outdoor leaders and supplies, as well as administrative costs (insurance and clerical). Trips within walking distance of a River location would be offered to schools in the Santa Clara River valley especially that have worked with FSCR such as Santa Paula HS, Briggs School and Fillmore Middle School.
