Message from the Minister

Here we arrive at the holiday season which will be unlike any that we can remember, whether in our homes, in our communities and here at UUCSP. In my neighborhood, Christmas decorations started to go up on some houses not long after Halloween. I love to imagine what Christmas was like in the early days of this Universalist congregation and before. Our Unitarian forebears were from Puritan stock and didn't celebrate Christmas at all until about 1830 when Charles Follen brought the tradition of the Christmas tree to America. Universalists, though, were another story.


Mary Rice had been raised in the Baptist faith and attended the Methodist church when she was teaching in Duxbury, Massachusetts until one Christmas when her life was changed forever. In her biography, A Strong-Minded Woman: The Life of Mary A. Livermore, Wendy Hamand West tells the story that she had been raised to disdain Christmas merriment to be unseemly. Perhaps feeling lonely, on Christmas Night 1844 she went out for a walk and was drawn by the music that emanated from Universalist church as she passed by. An usher invited her to enter, and she did. "The preacher," she later recalled, "was a young man, not more than twenty-five years old, blonde in complexion, with a good voice and a simple, earnest, prepossessing manner." She introduced herself to him after the service and the rest is history. Although Mary Rice had long believed that the Universalist Church was "outside the pale of Christian organizations," under Daniel Livermore's tutelage she began to rethink her views and learned the history and theology of the Universalist denomination. So it was that the music coming out of the church at Christmas pulled her in and transformed her life, from a new religion to a husband to her becoming the "queen of the platform".

Who knows what transformation each of us can find in this holiday season if we open to what new may break in? Perhaps this "different time" is just what we have needed to find new ways of being and ways to bring light and love to our hurting world.



Message from the Minister

WHAT THE PASTOR IS READING



A lot of what I read is to inform my sermons and other theological thinking as your minister. Before I came to Santa Paula, most years I hosted what was called a Blue Christmas service. I will be doing a version of it in collaboration with our Caring Committee on Thursday, December 17 at 3 PM. The book I am currently reading, The Weary World: Reflections for a Blue Christmas by Kathy Escobar, came out in 2020 and seems especially topical as many of us are having difficulty with the isolation of these last months, illnesses and deaths among our family and friends, economic challenges and more. But this time of year, can be difficult for many for many reasons. I will be using this book to reflect during the four weeks of Advent, that time of waiting leading up to Christmas Day. I have long used Advent as a time to reflect on my life, what my intentions might be for the new year that begins at the end of those four weeks and the holidays, and making meaning of the year past. And 2020 was a doozie! Are you feeling weary? Are you ready for a season of bright lights? Is there a path to hope? What are you reading?

It is not too soon to be thinking and planning for the Annual Meeting we will be holding on Zoom in January. Get some practice with Zoom by attending church services every Sunday you can on Zoom. Instead of hymns we'll be sharing documents on the screen to help run the meeting. One of your committee reports might just be projected so start getting ready.

On another topic I suggest you start researching the roots of Universalism. Our Unitarian Universalist denomination just celebrated the 250th anniversary of Universalism so attention is being paid to our roots. Digging into our Universalist archives here in Santa Paula has stimulated me to join a group on Zoom that talks about Universalism. It is called the Universalist Heritage Network. Most of the discussion is about what is going on to the east of us but I have a feeling that we can make Santa Paula famous due to our archives and roots in Universalism going back to the 1890s and before.

One piece of essential research came to me in the mail. I order used books a lot and Amazon is my LAST RESORT. I want to buy from independent booksellers whenever possible so I do my searching on a site called ABEBOOKS.com My recent purchase was a gently used paperback titled The Larger Faith by Charles A. Howe. It is "A Short History of American Universalism". It is condensed from a more extensive history that took up two volumes. I'll donate it to the church library after I finish it, but you might want your own.

Let's all grow our faith through the study of Universalism and a little Unitarianism while we're at it.

Zooming into January's Annual Meeting

Depending on placement in the newsletter, you may have read John Nichols' request to practice your Zoom-ing in preparation for the upcoming Annual Meeting. That meeting will be held after the regular church service on January 31, 2021 (exact time will be determined soon). We'll have retired one President by then, and our own Board President will be completing his term with our first ever online Annual Meeting, so we'll have lots of new and exciting endings and beginnings for the new year.

A few nuts and bolts, because that's what I do: The advent of online meetings requires us to change almost everything associated with them. For our committee chairs and anyone else who usually has an annual report included in our 'packet' – your due date is being set earlier: we're talking **the first week of January!** Board members, our minister, our associate minister... we are ALL being given this notice. Our VERY hard-working Office Administrator will need time to assemble everything and get it sent out to everyone well in advance of January 31.

The expectation this year is to send meeting packets via email. If you absolutely cannot receive them this way, please contact the church office as soon as possible to let us know. If they have to be mailed postally, there is more time, expense and worry involved but we do want everyone to know that they will be accommodated.

We are hoping to have all Annual Meeting information to members at least a week or ten days in advance. This will give everyone time to familiarize themselves with the reports, charts, nominations, and all that goes into the meeting. We will have technical support available, naturally, but are hoping to 'corral the cats' and not have the meeting get too chaotic. Questions and concerns will, of course, be welcomed, but in an online setting, again, things work differently. We will have folks monitoring the Zoom (I still think it ought to be Zuum) screens for raised hands, waving, etc. This reminds me to remind everyone that we will need to actually see you on screen to verify quorum, and to see when questions are requested. So, if you haven't been setting your camera on, here's that Hollywood screentest moment you've been waiting for.



Occupation: Jyl met Allan Atmore when they were both attending the University of California at Berkeley. When they moved to Santa Paula, Jyl was a young bride and her husband Allan was a farmer in the city he was raised. For many years, she was a housewife and a mother, as most women were in those days. After their three children graduated from college, she went back to college and earned a professional degree in interior design from the UCLA extension at UC Santa Barbara. After that she worked as a self-employed interior designer, doing mainly residential work. She was intimately involved in the design of the addition at our church.

What is your faith of origin?

Jyl's mother and grandmother were Christian Scientists, attending where she lived in Long Beach where Jyl attended Sunday School wondering why her father and brothers didn't have to go! When the family moved to the desert in Indio, Jyl attended the Methodist youth group with friends. When she arrived at college, her sorority sisters went to church, so she went Christian Science once but still found it to be, "Too much religion telling you what to do."

How did find out about Unitarian-Universalism and UUCSP?

Once Jyl moved to Santa Paula, she got involved in UUCSP because there was "No pressure." It was 1961, the year of the merger of the Universalists with the Unitarians into the UUA. She found the members to be very nice people. They didn't tell her what to believe. She especially remembers that Mary Louise Hardison, Logan's mother, was especially warm and welcoming. She found out later looking in the church archives that both sets of Allan's grandparents were signed members. Jyl has stayed a member all these years, despite times when she was busy with her children, school, and work. She always came back!

What do you find/hope to find here?

What it is—a wonderful, caring community. It is my extended family.

If you could have dinner with any religious/spiritual leader, past or present, who would you choose and why? The Reverend Berkeley Blake was the interim minister of UUCSP in the early 60s and my introduction to Unitarian Universalism. His daughter and son-in-law lived in Santa Barbara and he lived with them and then moved to Santa Paula when then minister Rev. Fred LeShane left to start the UU Church in Ventura and UUCSP was in need of an interim. Jyl remembers Rev. Blake as a wonderful, warm, old gentleman who was the last minister to live in the Parsonage which was on 7th Street. He loved nature and did a lot of sermons about Walden Pond and Thoreau. He loved to visit his parishioners and would just show up at their door! One thing he did that she especially appreciated was when son Tom needed surgery at 5 weeks old. Rev. Blake waited with them at the Foster Hospital in Ventura the whole time the baby was in surgery. She has never forgotten his ministry.

Membership is open to all persons 13 years of age or older without regard to race, color, gender, national origin, physical or mental challenges, sexual orientation, or gender identification. Members are expected to make an identifiable financial or service contribution.

Such accessibility sustained critical services like mental health counseling sessions for our valley residents, especially during the pandemic, hopefully bringing about greater health, sustainability, and wellbeing to our corner of the County.

8TH PRINCIPLE PROJECT

BIG WORK JOIN US BIG WORK JOIN US BIG WORK JOIN US

The Social Concerns Action Committee will meet **December 9, 4:00 pm**, to deepen the discussion on the proposed UUA 8th Principle which addresses our need and commitment to dismantle racism. The police killings of George Floyd and many others, raised the consciousness of many of the faith community. Specifically, in our national UU movement, action has been taken in the form of a draft proposal to add another Principle in response to the moment we are living in. The proposed 8th Principle is as follows"

"We, the member congregations of the Unitarian Universalist Association, covenant to affirm and promote: journeying toward spiritual wholeness by working to build a diverse multicultural Beloved Community by our actions that accountably dismantle racism and other oppressions in ourselves and our institutions."

Logan Hardison, a member of the Social Concerns Action Committee offers these comments on the 8th Principle:

The seven UU Principles have formed the belief structure for individual and congregational life for thirty years. Recent cases of police brutality to black and brown people and the disparate number of covid deaths among minorities now deemed "essential workers" paid minimum wage, if that, have brought into focus the glaring lack of social justice in these United States. Since the civil rights work and law changes of the 1960's now over fifty years ago, we have not moved on an upward path of civil rights and justice for all.

Our seven principles call on us to be "nice" people. We can harbor ill for no one yet leave the work for social justice in neutral. "The problem is not here." "We did not do it." "We aren't discriminating in our daily lives." Yet the systems of exclusion, disenfranchisement and unequal treatment continue visibly and invisibly.

The proposed 8th Principle calls on us to confront unjust systems and outcomes in accountable ways, and to recognize our positive actions to build equitable systems in government, organizations and communities. 


