# Message from the Board of Trustees

The Universalist half of our church's and denomination's name will soon be celebrating its 250<sup>th</sup> anniversary in the United States. What a milestone! Later on, in the church year you will hear Sunday services and learn of other ways we are honoring the sestercentennial. Our own congregation is significantly younger than that, at a mere 130. We have a relatively new Archives committee who are working to preserve the history and records we have accumulated in that century and (nearly) a third. For history buffs, their work will be fascinating, and for those to whom history is "just history" - I expect you will find some interesting tidbits or curiosities.

In more recent developments, our 129-year-old building is soon to be welcoming 21<sup>st</sup> century technology, as we build in the infrastructure for social media 'broadcasting' of Sunday services and other events. We won't be looking much different at first (or even second) glance. There will be a few extra electrical outlets that you will see once our building can reopen. Beyond that, nearly all the work will be beneath the floors.

Our budget has been doing well, considering the turmoil going on in our world. The Finance committee has been keeping tabs on things to aid the Board in its decision making. Surprising as it may seem, they are already working on our 2021 budget! That's my segue into asking you all to begin thinking about pledging for next church year. We haven't been able to do our usual fundraising, and even our Sunday plate offering isn't what it usually is, understandably. Our budget will depend more than usual next year on the results of our upcoming canvass. That committee will be meeting soon, and you can expect to hear some novel ways of preparing for the congregation's upcoming monetary needs.

Take care, keep in touch with each other, and we look forward to seeing you in Zoom-church. That reminds me... maybe we should rechristen it ZUUm?!



### Annual Notice of Membership Requirements for the Universalist Unitarian Church of Santa Paula

From our Bylaws, Article III – Membership:

A. Any Person who is in sympathy with the purpose and program of this church may become a member by signing the membership book, subject to acceptance by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees or the members present at any legal meeting of the congregation.

B. Membership in this church shall be open to all persons 13 years of age or older without regard to race, color, gender, national origin, physical or mental challenges, sexual orientation, or gender identification.

C. Once a person has been accepted as a member, membership rights shall continue as long as s/he indicates, when asked, the intention to continue as a member, and makes identifiable financial or service contributions.

John Nichols was a black and white darkroom photographer for over 30 years. Eighteen years ago, he made the leap to both color photography and digital printing. The darkroom is now a wine cellar and he now prints both grayscale and color on paper and canvas using state of the art printers using archival pigmented inks.

After teaching for 9 years he moved on to open the John Nichols Gallery in Santa Paula in 1984 and then a bookstore called Mr. Nichols. He offered curatorial services to museums and organizations throughout Ventura County and was curator at the California Oil Museum for 10 years. His current gallery is on the second floor of the Santa Paula Art Museum.

He was previously president of the congregation in the 1980s and has been a Rotarian for 35 years and was named Rotarian of the Year. He is past president of the Santa Paula Historical Society, Downtown Merchants Association, Santa Paula Chamber Business of the Year, board member of the Museum of Ventura County and currently the Santa Paula Art Museum. He has worked on the crew at the Monterey Jazz Festival for over 40 years.

He began writing for newspapers and magazines about 30 years ago and the results are published in his Kindle book "Essay Man". He also wrote The St. Francis Dam Disaster, the Santa Paula Portrait Project, Mexico 1895, and The Vernacular Bestiary.

In 2010 John was selected to be interviewed and documented by Focus on the Masters. Focus on the Masters is a non-profit art appreciation program that documents, preserves and presents the works and lives of accomplished contemporary artists. Their archive includes oral histories, videotaped interviews, photographic portraits, and examples of the artists' work.

Photographs by John Nichols are in the permanent collection of the Museum of Ventura County, the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center, Univ. of Austin, Texas, the Jackson Wheeler Collection (gifted to the Carnegie Art Museum, Oxnard), the City of Ventura, Santa Paula Art Museum,

Ventura Community Memorial Hospital and numerous private collections. Selected exhibits include the Santa Paula Art Museum, the California Oil Museum, the Museum of Ventura County, Ojai Art Center, Ojai Valley Museum, Annual Santa Paula Art and Photography Shows, Carnegie Art Museum and others. For several years he has been collaborating with Gail Pidduck to produce art about agriculture exhibits. That lead to the development of the Ag Art Alliance to further promote exhibits for artists working in the field of art about agriculture.

#### What is your faith of origin?

In about 5th grade or so a neighbor invited us to a Sunday school service. I went once and we were assigned to memorize one line from the bible, and I would get a free bible. I didn't do it, but they gave me the bible anyway. That action told me that I could not value anything in the bible because I did not have to work to understand it. A gift without any effort was meaningless in this case. My dad was raised Plymouth Brethren and often would tell the story about the men in the church telling him he would burn in hell for all eternity for not accepting Jesus.

#### How did find out about Unitarian-Universalism?

In 1958 my mom was seeking some religion. She was attracted to the occult and things like that. She heard about Unity Church and got out the phone book and called the closest thing...Universalist. She got Fred LeShane on the phone. I think he had just left the church in SP and moved to Ventura and became a Unitarian. He asked her what sort of thing she was looking for and after she talked a bit he said maybe she should look into Unitarianism. They joined the church in the first year or so in Ventura, almost charter members. Why did Fred move and change religions??? I joined the LRY and became president and started babysitting for church members and got to hang out at their homes and read their books and listen to their records and get inspired. I went to Starr King for 3 weeks in my senior year to study theology.

#### Why UUCSP? What do you find/ hope to find here?

More questions. Synchronicity guides me so I don't seek, I wait until things drop into my lap. Things and ideas are constantly falling into my lap and onto my path and I only notice some. I would become better at noticing that which is being given to me as I open my selves up to greater awareness of my existence.

# If you could have dinner with any religious/spiritual leader, past or present, who would you choose and why?

If I said Meher Baba it wouldn't be any fun because he took a vow of silence. Which spiritual leader that you know of would drink wine? That's IT. Jesus because he would not have to bring his own wine but just turn my water into wine for the party.

Again, this year for this last quarter we will support Interface Children & Family Services, thereby providing many needed services for our fellow Santa Paula residents now during this pandemic. Thanks to our tax-deductible year-end gifts this time last year at year, Interface provided direct services to 1,378 adults, teens, and children who live in and around Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru. Interface also provided critical information and referral services to 1,005 community members via 211 Information & Assistance.

By calling 211 people are able to access help right when they need it right there in their homes, thanks to remote access. Be it assistance for problems relating to domestic violence, mental health issues, child abuse prevention, or trauma treatment, help is forthcoming. No more re-arranging schedules to comply with difficult appointment times; no more transporting the children along for lack of childcare. Such accessibility brought about a 225% increase in the number of counselling sessions for our valley residents, hopefully bringing about greater health, sustainability, and wellbeing to our corner of the County.

We are fortunate in having easy access to Interface's many services. Let's help Santa Paulans and Santa Clara River Valley residents get the professional counselling services they need. Let's support Interface!
