Message from the Board of Trustees

Hello and welcome to November from your Board of Trustees.

As always, we hope all is well with you and yours. As the year begins to wind down, we are reminded of all those tasks that need attention and we'll mention at least a few here.

The date of our annual meeting has been set for January 23, 2022. This is a tad earlier than in some years, in part due to there being five Sundays in the month. The date also requires that the Board hold its January meeting on the 13th. The schedule will also have to be adjusted for all finance committee work on the budget, which means, naturally, that we'll be asking all committee/task force chairs and others who have requests for the budget to have those requests placed earlier in the process than in past years. The budget task force (aka: Finance committee) will begin preliminary work this month, so it is certainly not too early to be looking ahead to what your requests might be.

We expect that Our New UU in 2022 will begin opening up more and more as the pandemic lessens its grip on us all. Committees will become more active and we're hoping for a quick return of the Concert Series, as well as all the 'new usual' activities that make our congregation so interesting and engaging. We hope you have all returned your pledge cards. This is the single biggest budget item to 'work around' and it is a great help to have them all in-hand early in the process so that we can accurately determine what we have to balance out or expenses.

On the non-monetary side of things, our Nominating committee will be at work filling positions soon. There are two full two-year term (with the possibility of a third one-year term) board positions to elect or re-elect; two members of the Building Preservation Fund must be elected or re-elected (3-year terms); three Cash Reserve trustees will be elected, one of which is chosen by the congregation; one member of the Committee on Congregational Life is due for election or re-election (2-year term); and of course, next year's Nominating committee itself will be selected.

If all this seems like "a lot," it's because it is!! We may be a small congregation, but there is much that must be done to keep us going. As we rise up as a New UU in '22, I hope you will all consider where and how you can put your talents to work, or to find new talents you didn't know you had. It takes a village, it has been said, and nowhere is that more true than in our beloved church community.

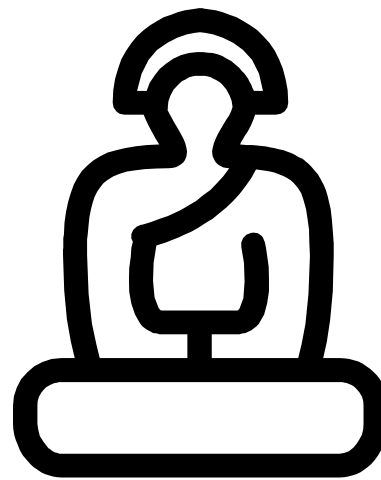

ABOUT INTERFACE

Interface is Ventura County's leading nonprofit social services agency, providing free, proven, and responsive services to address the complex physical and emotional needs of 59,000 local clients every year. Its 30 programs utilize evidence-based practices to serve children, teens, adults and families who are typically low-income and struggling with poverty, domestic violence, human trafficking, homelessness, incarceration, child abuse, neglect and abandonment. Interface also connects callers to a vast network of health and human services in 40 counties through its 211 Information & Assistance program.

Interface Children & Family Services:

Serving Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru

In 2020, Interface provided direct services to nearly 100 adults, teens and children who live in and around Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru. We also provided critical information and referral services to over 3,000 community members via 211 Information & Assistance. These calls ranged from housing assistance and shelter needs to food insecurity and unemployment assistance, as well as the most current information about COVID testing and vaccination availability.

The Interface team has worked hard to create innovative program and service delivery methods to ensure our community retains access to crucial mental health treatment as well as domestic violence & human trafficking intervention and family support services and education.

Mental Health & Trauma Treatment

Interface served 58 children, teens and adults residing in Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru with free, high-quality, culturally inclusive mental health services, including: individual and family therapy, specific trauma therapy including child abuse treatment, preventative parenting education, and intensive family preservation services (Homebuilders).

Runaway & Homeless Youth

Interface served 16 adolescents and transition-aged youth in Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru with our Housing Support Services which includes our emergency and transitional shelter, street outreach, counseling, family mediation and more. Interface continues to operate the only shelter for runaway and homeless teens in Ventura County.

Domestic Violence & Child Abuse Prevention

During the 2019/2020 academic year, Interface served 12 Santa Paula, Fillmore and/or Piru individuals and families who were fleeing domestic violence with crisis response, emergency shelter, and/or counseling, case management and supportive services.

Interface presented the My Body Belongs to Me (MBBTM) child abuse prevention education program in Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru. MBBTM served 917 children, parents, and educators from these cities. Sites we served included:

- Bob Borrego Child Care Center (CDR), Santa Paula
- Santa Paula Child Care Center (CDR), Santa Paula
- San Cayetano Elementary School, Fillmore
- Fillmore Child Care Center (CDR), Fillmore
- Piru Elementary School, Piru

Interface also presented Teen Dating Violence Prevention program, a universal healthy-relationships education program, to 131 teens in Santa Paula. Sites included:

- Santa Paula High School
- Our Lady of Guadalupe Church-Youth Group

211 Information & Assistance

211 Ventura County responded to 3,130 calls from residents of Santa Paula, Fillmore and Piru. Of these, 224 callers identified as homeless and 188 indicated they were at imminent risk of becoming homeless within 14 days. Housing was the top category of need, followed by mental health and addictions and income support.

COMMITTEE ON CONGREGATIONAL LIFE

According to the Bylaws of the Universalist Unitarian Church of Santa Paula, the Committee on Congregational Life's primary mission to evaluate the overall effectiveness of the congregation's ministry (ordained, staff and laity). The COCL is not a committee of the Board, but a committee of the congregation in special relationship to the Board. It consists of three members serving staggered terms of two years each, with no member serving more than three consecutive terms. Current members are Judy Triem, Ken Stock and the Rev. Dr. Betty Stapleford. Members are encouraged to let Rev. Maddie or one of the members of the committee know if there are any issues of the ministries of the congregation of which they should be aware.

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SANTA PAULA CINEMA SOCIETY

It's guilty pleasure time, and one of guiltiest of them of all is watching films made in the era before the Production Code came into full force.

In the "pre-code" era, prior to the morality clamp-down by the Breen Office in 1934, a person could be bad. Really bad. And few of them could be badder than Jean Harlow, who at the time **Red-Headed Woman** was made in 1932 was coming fully into her siren of seduction typecasting. In this one, Harlow plays a girl who schemes to sleep her way to the top. Yes, they could do that then! In fact this is one of the films said to be most responsible for the calls to implement the Production Code, which up to that time existed only on paper. Sure, these films are tame by current standards (HBO has nothing to fear), but they are still surprising in the way they could deal so frankly with amoral themes that were placed firmly off-limits by the code for the next three decades, including sexual innuendo, marital infidelity, and bad guys who got away with it. And because of their subject matter and presentation, many of these films disappeared from circulation entirely after 1933, or reappeared in sanitized versions. Only in recent years could they once again be seen as the Depression-era audiences saw them. With Chester Morris, Lewis Stone, Leila Hyams, and Una Merkel (and look quickly for Charles Boyer). One of the uncredited screenwriters was none other than F. Scott Fitzgerald! (1:19)

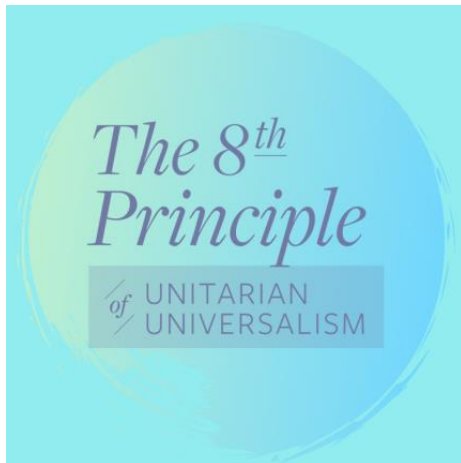
CARING COMMITTEE
