Message from the Minister

Our theme this month is Courage. Beautiful and terrible things do happen. How do we move forward in these times with courage and love in our hearts? How do we have the courage of our convictions? How do we bring courage to the inevitable changes in our lives? One way we do that, it seems to me, is by marking the changes rather than ignoring them, as with rites of passages such as Weddings, Memorial Services, Child Dedications and the like. Another way we do it is with special occasions and holidays, including marking the changing of the seasons which we often call the Wheel of the Year. This month we will once again mark the turning into autumn with our traditional Day of the Dead service on October 30, which is our Unitarian Universalist version of what our friends may mark as All Soul's Day or All Saint's Day, coming at the same time as Halloween and our neighbors *Dias de los Muertos*. It is a sort of hodge-podge mixing of Christianity, the secular, and age-old rituals celebrating the deaths of ancestors. Together we will create an altar of pictures and artifacts that remind us of those who came before us. I know I will be bringing mementos and pictures of the many people I lost this year, and I will look forward to seeing what you may bring.

At times like these we are often aware of our own mortality, and it may be a good time for some self-reflection this month. I recently read about a palliative care nurse, Bronnie Ware, who worked with people at the end of life and wrote an interesting list which she made into a book, *The Top Five Regrets of the Dying*.

- 5) *I wish I had let myself be happier.*
- 4) *I wish I had stayed in touch with my friends.*
- 3) *I wish I'd had the courage to express my feelings.*
- 2) *I wish I hadn't worked so hard.*
- 1) *I wish I'd had the courage to live a life true to myself, not the life others expected of me.*

Food for thought for each of us.

As we gather to mark the Day of the Dead this year, may we share our memories of loved ones and share our love here with each other.

Message from the Board of Trustees

Dear UU community and friends,

We celebrated Latino Heritage Month at church on Sunday 9/18 and many of you reached out to tell me how much you loved this service! This national recognition of the contributions and history of Latinos, I encourage us to continue to celebrate this 84% of our community all year long at UU Church of Santa Paula.

Umbrella terms like Latino, Latinx, Chicano & Hispanic are always problematic because they get applied to large groups of people who have different cultures, languages, nationalities... the main thing to remember is to always let people tell you how they identify.

Here is a little vocabulary history on some key terms to know:

Hispanic: First used by the federal government in a census was 1980, a result from decades of lobbying in the 1960s, &1970s. Hispanic refers to those from Spain & other Spanish speaking countries, which excluded Brazilians. Grace Flores-Hughes, who worked as a secretary in the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, has said she coined the term. Popularized by Telemundo.

Latino: Refers to those from Latin America, meaning it includes Brazil, but not Spain. Latino is short for Latino Americano, resulting as Latin American countries became independent from 1808-1821. Some still rejected the term as it attempted to group several distinct cultures into one. Those who did not want to identify as Hispanic or Latino chose nationality.

Chicano: Used by Mexicans who did not identify as Latino or Hispanic. Unclear origin. One of the first mentions of Chicano in print is in the newspaper La Cronica in 1911, where it was used as a slur against “less cultured” Mexican Americans and recent immigrants. But the term was reclaimed in the 1960s as it gained traction among Mexican Americans who were fighting for civil rights.

Latinx: Emerged as a gender inclusive term at the intersection of feminism and inclusion of the LGBTQ+ community. Several theories on origin, it is believed it was created by English-speaking U.S Latinx people for use in English conversation. It’s a term that gained momentum through the 2010s and 2020s, cropping up on TV shows and in politics.

Message from the Board of Trustees

Annual Notice of Membership Requirements for the Universalist Unitarian Church of Santa Paula

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

- A. Any person who is in sympathy with the purpose and program of this church may become a member by signing the membership book, subject to acceptance by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees or the members present at any legal meeting of the congregation.
- B. Membership in this church shall be open to all persons 13 years of age or older without regard to race, color, gender, national origin, marital status, physical or mental challenges, sexual orientation, or gender identification.
- C. Once a person has been accepted as a member, membership rights shall continue as long as they indicate, when asked, the intention to continue as a member, and make identifiable financial or service contributions.
- D. The Board of Trustees shall give written notice of membership requirements in the newsletter in October/November of each year and shall review the membership roll every November/December. Any member who, during the preceding fiscal year, has not met the conditions for continuing membership as stated in the preceding paragraph may be moved to inactive status. Any member who dies or who submits a letter of resignation to the Board of Trustees shall be removed from membership at the next regular meeting of the Board. Any inactive member who again meets the requirements for continuing membership shall be restored to active status by the Board of Trustees at its next regular meeting.
- E. All active members, age 16 and over, are eligible to vote at any legal meeting of the congregation. Active members ages 13 through 15 may vote only on issues that are youth-related. However, active members under age 16 are welcome to voice their ideas and opinions on any issues before the congregation. Inactive members are not eligible to vote.

Long View Planning Committee Communication

At the January 31, 2021 annual meeting, the congregation approved the formation of a "committee to study and create a financial strategy for the church's future and legacy finances, to include building/land and Capital Fund" to address UUCSP activities related to maintaining a liberal religious voice in the Santa Clara River Valley.

In May 2022, the Board appointed Logan Hardison, Laura Phillips, Ann Hewitt, MaryBeth East and Kate English to the task force and meetings began. Thus far, a charter has been drafted and orientation discussions started. The group envisions its activities to include an ongoing dialog to advise and inform the current and future Board members of fiscal priorities, organizational benchmarks, and trigger points for short and long-term planning as well as an assessment of tangible and intangible assets.

Upcoming meetings will be posted in church announcements for members who wish to attend, and updates provided in the church newsletter or weekly emails.

SPIRITUAL GROWTH CENTER

Rev. Maddie created the Spiritual Growth Center at the Universalist Unitarian Church of Santa Paula when she arrived in January 2015. During the last two years of pandemic, the only three activities that have continued have been the Gathering, Yoga on Tuesday and Thursday mornings with Lisa Hammond and our Meditation Practice Group with Rev. Maddie alternating with psychologist Jim Cole. In the past, we have offered End of Life planning, Singing Meditation, evenings with teacher Gurdeep Singth. We are now adding a second meditation group on Mondays with Corrine Carson. The Spiritual Growth Center is meant to include our adult religious education offerings and spiritual practices, providing opportunities and programs to awaken and sustain love, compassion, service, and personal transformation. Our goal is to help individuals discover how spiritual practice, learning, and community service can transform their lives and move the world toward peace and justice. Our programs are guided by the set of Seven Principles of Unitarian Universalism and the Six Sources they draw from. One of the Principles affirms our intention to accept one another and encourage each other's spiritual growth. Please let Rev. 




Mary A's October 2022 Meeting


DAY OF THE DEAD ALTAR



Building a Dia de los Muertos altar is an important part of celebrating Mexico's most famous holiday, Day of the Dead. Traditionally, families will build altars in their homes during the weeks leading up to November 1st, as a way to celebrate and remember loved ones who have passed to the other side. Many Unitarian Universalist congregations build Day of the Dead altars as we will be doing for our service on Sunday, October 30, as a way of honoring Mexican traditions and encouraging cross-cultural understanding, especially noting the community in which we live. Please bring something to put on the altar when you come to church on Sunday honoring an ancestor, friend or pet who has died.

ALL CHURCH READ

Every year we participate in the UUA's Common Read which we call the All Church Read. The 2022–2023 UU Common Read is [Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism](#) by Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin, published by Skinner House Books. The Common Read builds community in our congregations and our movement by giving diverse people a shared platform for reflection and a shared focus for action. Rev. Maddie preached about this book when it was first released several years ago and is a natural fit for us as we think about how to welcome our neighbors to our activities and services and be involved with our community here in Santa Paula.



What calls Unitarian Universalists to create multicultural, antiracist Beloved Community? What do congregations need when they embark on this journey? What common threads run through their stories? In *Mistakes and Miracles*, Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin—a white minister and a lay person of color—share how five diverse congregations encounter frustrations and disappointments, as well as hope and wonder, once they commit to the journey. The world has seen much turmoil, pain, and yes, glimmers of hope, in the three years since the publication of *Mistakes and Miracles*. As we enter a Common Read of this book, we find ourselves receiving its report with a changed spirit, an urgent need, and perhaps new hope for multiculturalism and antiracism work in our movement. We will be discussing it together in early 2023 so start reading now!




