# Message from the Minister

#### MESSAGE FROM REV. MADDIE: WELCOME TO LIBERATING LOVE

Here we are starting another new year together, all of us in this beloved community. It starts my tenth year with you since my arrival on January 2, 2015. One of the many things we have experienced together was the move over the years to subscriptions to UU theme-based resources, first with Touchstones and the last several years with Soul Matters. Our Soul Matters theme for January 2024 is Liberating Love. Here is their reflection on the theme to help us in our own reflections as individuals and this faith community:

Love, it sits in the chest, at least at the start.

It's what makes our heart beat again after being broken, and our lungs breathe again after being closed off in the dark for far too long.

For some, it came in the form of our grandfather's eyes which saw us as carriers of something bigger and more precious and older than our little bodies disclosed.

For others, it arrived as we pressed hard against our mothers' warm skin and heard a speechless whisper say we can always come home.

We recognize love as the thing that allowed us to finally remove our masks, or that which said I don't want you to take it off, until you are ready. We were taught love by those who arrived in the midst of our fear and shook as we shook, instead of simply trying to make our trembling stop.

But here is the secret. The inevitable awakening. The wonder that each of our lives is meant to reveal. Love doesn't just love us; It asks us to become it.

That's why those metaphors of comforting quilts which wrap us in their warmth will never do. True love is always a thunderstorm that cracks us clean open so the echoes of other breaking hearts can make their way in.

Yes, it wants us to be whole and strong. But love's deepest longing is that we will use that strength to tear down the structures that leave others bloodied and bruised. We must always remember what Selma's prophet of peace regularly preached: Love and power are always rightly wed.

And maybe this is where the second secret comes loose. As I shake the walls to let others free, I learn that the ones I've liberated include me.

# Message from Board of Trustees

The Annual Meeting of the Universalist Unitarian Church of Santa Paula will be held via Zoom at 12:30 p.m. on January 28, 2024 - after the Sunday Service and a short break. Election of two Board Trustees, one Cash Reserve Fund Trustee, one Committee on Congregational Life member, and next year's Nominating Committee team will occur.

In addition to these elections, we will vote to adopt our 2024 operating budget. We will hear from our Minister, and several committees will augment their written reports. Those written reports, the budget and complete agenda, along with the minutes of the 2023 Annual Meeting (the "packet") will be sent via email to members after the Board of Trustees accepts the budget submitted by the Finance Committee, which should happen at the January 18 regular board meeting.

The Building Preservation Fund Trustees and Building and Grounds Committee have worked closely with the Board of Trustees to propose updates to Amendment III of our church's bylaws. The Amendment, showing proposed changes, will be sent as part of the packet prior to the Annual meeting.

During the Zoom Annual Meeting – and we will reiterate this at the time – folks will be muted, except for the designated speaker. There is just no way to hear more than one person at a time. Our technology team will be watching for questions, nominations, raised hands and such, and there is the chat feature on Zoom. All who wish to speak will be heard.

If you are one who normally blocks their camera during services, we will need you to be visible during the meeting so that we know who is in attendance. Our bylaws require a quorum be present at any meeting of the congregation, and we will be using screen view to verify that everyone is who they seem to be. Thank you for your cooperation.

If you require a printed packet to be mailed to you, please advise our Office Administrator Krystal. It should arrive by post with plenty of time for you to familiarize yourself with it. Emailed packets should arrive about a week prior to the meeting. Please make sure that the church office has your current address.

Those who submit reports for the Annual Meeting packets should all have been notified that the deadline is again earlier this year. If you haven't already done so, please send your report in Microsoft Word or plain text format to Krystal by the first week of January.

We ask those who give verbal reports at the meeting not to repeat what is in their printed reports, but to make any additional comments or answer any queries from the congregation. Thank you again for your understanding.



### SANTA PAULA CINEMA SOCIETY



Our first film of the year is the haunting 2014 documentary on the work of famed Brazilian photographer Sebastião Salgado, directed by Wim Wenders and Salgado's son, Juliano Ribeiro Salgado.

The film covers four decades of Salgado's epic work as a photographer, beginning during the early 1970s when he gave up a career as an economist in France to pursue his newfound passion. His mission became documenting conflict, famine, refugees, and landscapes, as they are both preserved and trammeled by human beings. After many years of virtually obsessive global travel, Salgado became so disheartened by what he'd witnessed and photographed around the world, he retired to back to his family ranch in Brazil. There he began a project to restore the rainforests, starting on his own land. Ultimately this effort reignited his hope for humanity and drew him back to photography with new purpose — to document this project, as well as the native peoples of Brazil.

The film is beautifully illustrated by Salgado's stunning work and in the narration by Wenders and his son Juliano Salgado. A visual treat, and thought-provoking as well. Winner of the 2014 Cannes Film Festival Special Prize. (1:50)





Readers explore our own call to be accountable in these modern times as we follow Rabbi Ruttenberg into a framework for making amends offered by the 12th century Jewish physician and scholar, Maimonides.
