Arise, my love, my fair one, and come away." How wonderful that some rains did come, and flowers are blooming all around town, and we can tend our roses here at our historic building, just as each of us tidies up our steps and yards at home. What joy the rebirth of our earth brings and the increasing light. Next month we will be on to Beltane—May Day! The coming of spring also makes me think why do people join religious communities? I suspect that there are many answers to that question but at its most basic, it is to find meaning, to be reborn into a life of more meaning. What does it mean at a time of ministerial transition? What is our purpose as religious liberals? How much does being part of our congregation mean to you? That is what we ask ourselves when we support the congregation through financial gifts, our gifts of time, and our commitment to the future of this place and its people. Message from Board of Trustees

It's taken a bit longer than I would have liked to get out the first board message of 2024. So many things to learn as board president! One of them is remembering to write these little missives to the membership, and on time besides.

This is going to be a busy year for us, and one of transition and change.

On the financial side, the church is in pretty good shape, especially for a congregation of our size. We have the endowment of our Capital Fund to thank. Years of generous contributions and investment prudence is paying dividends to us now.

This year is going to be financially somewhat less predictable with Rev. Maddie leaving us in July. To cover any possible contingencies the board asked for an additional \$10,000 be made available to the General Fund from the Capital Fund. We're hopeful that once all the expenses and pledges are tallied up, these extra funds won't be needed to balance the budget. But it's there if we do.

We've received a contribution from the Chouinard family trust again this year. They've been supporting the church in this way for around 25 years, going all the way back to the first fundraisers for the stained-glass window restoration. The contribution will be transferred to the Building Preservation Fund for use in building maintenance.

The Preservation Fund and the Building and Grounds committee were merged with the bylaw's amendments approved by the congregation at the Annual Meeting at the beginning of the year. This should simplify matters for how we decide which projects are preservation and which are maintenance. When you're dealing with a 133-year-old historic building, as we are, every building project is preservation!

One of the items on our list is hiring a building inspector to provide us with a comprehensive look at our building and its needs, both immediate and long-term. This is something we've never had before.

Speaking of which, we came through this winter's rains with no leaks. We did lose a gutter and downspout off the back of the building in one of the storms. It's been repaired.

The largest item on our agenda is naturally Rev. Maddie's departure. The Ministerial Search Committee, chaired by Ann Hewitt, is hard at work. The online paperwork for advertising for a contract minister has now been filed with the UUA. The good news we're getting from the UUA is the number of prospective ministers seeking congregations is larger this year than in the recent past. We're hoping many will consider us!

Finally, as you may have heard, a revised membership roster is available. Printed copies can be picked up in the Parish Hall, or digitally by email from Krystal (<u>uucspoffice@gmail.com</u>).

And I nearly forgot to mention — your board this year is Ann Hewitt, Ken Stock, Jerry Gray, Margaret Wilson, and myself. Please feel free to contact any one of us with questions, concerns, or ideas!

Friends of the Santa Clara River/Nature Conservancy



The Santa Clara Preserve spans almost two miles of this amazing waterway and encompasses nearly 1,000 acres of upland habitat and riverbed.

There are few locations on the Santa Clara River that are accessible to the public. Now with the opening of this preserve, TNC has provided a beautiful space for outdoor education, community gatherings, wildlife viewing and hiking. On the preserve we want to give everyone a chance to connect with the dynamic Santa Clara River. The Nature Conservancy has made major strides in protecting one of the most important and intact river systems in Southern California. The Santa Clara River is a vital source of drinking water for the local community, as well as a key resource for many prosperous farms. It also offers some of the last riverside and freshwater habitat for wildlife in the bustling Los Angeles-Ventura region. Despite its local and regional ecological importance, the lower Santa Clara River is threatened by invasive non-native vegetation, intense levee building, poor water quality, conversion from agriculture to urban land uses and increasing development in the floodplain. In 2005, American Rivers designated the Santa Clara River as one of the most threatened rivers in the nation.

Starting high up in the Angeles National Forest in Los Angeles County, flowing down into Ventura County and into the estuary at McGrath State Beach, the Santa Clara River and its tributaries are surrounded by more than 12 million people. As the population soars, urban sprawl bears down on the river and its watershed, threatening:

- The supply and quality of the region's freshwater, including precious groundwater reservoirs that are fed by the river;
- The farmers whose fields and groves line the river and surrounding lands, making a healthy contribution to the local economy and regional identity; and
- The plants and animals within the watershed that rely on the extensive habitat of the river system, including a staggering 16 species within one mile of the mainstem of the river that are federally and/or state listed as threatened or endangered.

Adding to the pressure, 95% of Southern California's river and wetland habitat has already been lost. In fact, this is one of the last rivers in Southern California that remains relatively natural. Other major rivers in the region, including the Santa Ana, San Gabriel and Los Angeles, have been reduced from lush, flowing rivers to largely concrete channels with very little wildlife habitat.





The Abromowitz family is up-and-coming, but going nowhere in a hurry — other than from one ratty Beverly Hills apartment to another, only steps ahead of the landlord. It's the mid-70s and divorced dad Murray (Alan Arkin) keeps them constantly on move from one place to another they can't afford, but always to somewhere else within the Beverly Hills city limits, so his kids can attend the schools. Murray may be a lousy car salesman, but in his own own befuddled way, is trying his best to be a good father to his teenage son and daughter.

As they bounce from place to place the only constant in their lives is

As they bounce from place to place the only constant in their lives is throwing everything they own into the car as if they were evacuating from a flood. Meanwhile, daughter Vivian (Natasha Lyonne) is coming of age, and filling out in a way that startles everyone, including her. A neighbor, the unreliable Eliot (Kevin Corrigan) certainly takes notice. Her sardonic older brother David (David Krumholtz) is getting up to whoknows-what. The Abromowitz's already upside-down life is exposed to further turmoil when Murray's niece Rita (Marisa Tomei) turns up, an escapee from drug rehab. Rita is a mess, but she can supply Vivian with a few lessons on budding womanhood.

If this all sounds like a dark situation comedy, it is — but this 1998 semi-autobiographical film by writer/director Tamara Jenkins is also very funny, well-observed, and performed. Jenkins has real affection for these hapless characters, and probably so will you after watching this film. Be advised, Slums of Beverly Hills is on the raunchy side (R-rated).



Although anyone is allowed to attend, UUCSP is allowed 2 voting delegates who are appointed by the Board in addition to Rev. Maddie and Rev. Betty. Delegates must register for GA in order to vote. Delegates have two options:

- 1. Full registration for online events or
- 2. Business only registration, which provides access to the Delegate Platform for discussion and voting. The latter does not require payment, but a donation is suggested to offset production and platform costs.
