Message from Congregational Director

Dear Beloved Members and Friends,

As we settle into the rhythm of a new year, I'm delighted to share reflections and updates from my first month as your Congregational Director. This new role, created just weeks before the end of 2024, opens up exciting avenues for our congregation as we continue in our period of ministerial transition. With the support of so many of you, I'm finding my way and feeling deeply grateful for the warmth and kindness that surround me here. With especial thanks to Ann Hewitt, my supervising Board representative, whose support has been steadfast and encouraging, like that of a guardian angel; and Krystal Johnson, who is behind all things, supporting nearly every facet of our great church.

One of the most poignant moments this month was bidding farewell to Rev. Dr. Betty Stapleford, whose wisdom and leadership have left an indelible mark on our congregation. Betty's final service, "Purple: More Than Just a Color," was a moving celebration of her time with us. At her farewell coffee hour, Mayor Pedro Chavez presented her with a token of appreciation on behalf of the city of Santa Paula; and the Caring Committee gifted her a beautiful lavender "purple" rose bush, and the SCAC a Friendship Bridge-inspired traditional handmade artisanal doll, on behalf of a truly grateful congregation.

Looking ahead, our Worship Team, under Ruth Ricards' capable leadership, is gearing up for an exciting year of services. February features a tapestry of themes, including the Jewish holiday TuBishvat, Black History Month, the Islamic holy month of Ramadan, and a whimsical exploration of *The Cult of the Hibernating Bear*, presented by John Nichols and Marybeth East. In the months to come, we'll honor World Down Syndrome Day, the Spring Equinox, Easter, LGBTQIA+ Pride, Trans Day of Visibility, and much, much more. I also look forward to contributing up to two spirit-filled sermons each month, including in March: *Simply Messing About in Boats*, in which I will hope to share with you my passion for the sea. We'll also welcome a variety of guest speakers—from ministers and authors to sages and storytellers—who I hope will bring fresh perspectives and eternal wisdom to our pulpit.

Our church's commitment to pastoral care remains strong. I've had the privilege of supporting our active Caring Committee, which "carefully" offers timely aid to members and friends in need, including Mary Nelson, Rev. Dr. Audrey Vincent, and others.

Meanwhile, we've added donation-based evening all-level yoga classes led by my husband, Vibay Weisbecker, to our weekly yoga offerings. And as zazen remains a cornerstone of my own spiritual life, I am so pleased that Rev. Sei Kai from the Santa Paula Pine Mountain Buddhist Temple has generously offered to lead us in meditation on the first Wednesday of each month at 6pm PST. These gatherings should not only enrich our spirits with the peace of "Buddhism" but also strengthen our bonds within the wider community.

We also said goodbye to long-time member Allan Atmore with a beautiful memorial service that necessitated the raising of our great wood-paneled doors. This collaborative effort showcased the best of our congregation, with heartfelt contributions from Rev. Betty, Logan Hardison, Alice Henderson, Leslie Nichols, Marybeth East, Vincent Sorisio, Giselle Larios, and others, including young members



Allan was an impressive and beloved father, grandfather, husband, and friend, and will be dearly missed, yet I am comforted that his legacy lives on in our hearts and actions. Our thoughts and prayers are with Jyl, Tom, Doug, and family during this time of great loss.

As a volunteer member of our Social Concerns Action Committee, I am pleased to report that our group is focused on tackling important local issues, including the potential impacts of federal immigration policies. Collaborating with groups like Poder Popular and a local coalition calling itself *Somos Inmigrantes*, we are reflecting on what it truly means to be a sanctuary church. These discussions are critical as we prepare to meet potential challenges with compassion and clarity, while embodying our values as Unitarian Universalists.

On a personal note, I will soon initiate a new phase of my academic journey, as I pursue ministerial fellowship with the Unitarian Universalist Association. This path will include coursework in UU history and polity, as well as chaplaincy work. I look forward to sharing milestones with you as I work toward prospective ordination.

As I reflect on my first month, I'm struck by the incredible spirit of collaboration, resilience, creativity, and wisdom that defines our congregation and its individuals. I believe that together, across faiths, generations, genders, orientations, hair styles, and body types, we are crafting a vibrant path forward for our historic church! Thank you for your trust. SIP AND CHECK IN WITH SHARON KUFELDT TUESDAY, February 11 AT 4 PM ON ZOOM



SANTA PAULA CINEMA SOCIETY



A time comes in almost every great filmmaker's career when they are widely seen as having totally lost their minds. It happened to Buster Keaton with *The General*, and to Stanley Kubrick many times, but especially with *Barry Lyndon*. Hitchcock's moment of supposed madness came with the release of *Vertigo* in 1958. Though it arrived sandwiched between two of his blockbusters, *The Man Who Knew* Too Much and North by Northwest, critics and audiences alike were horrified by Vertigo, generally shocked and revolted by this strange tale of sexual obsession. Thematically it was just too much to accept, especially from the master of suspense, and particularly in the context of the neo-Victorian mores of the 1950s. The film fell into obscurity - partly for this reason - and also due to a copyright dispute that set it adrift for years, with only poor prints remaining in circulation. When the film was finally rediscovered and restored decades later, Hitchcock's vision for the film was seen again as he intended it to be seen, and reevaluated with contemporary eyes. And like the works of those other filmmakers who supposedly had gone completely insane, Vertigo was declared to be one of Hitchcock's masterworks, and an essential film in his catalog. Hitch will forever have the last laugh on all of us, it seems. Featuring James Stewart, Kim Novak, Barbara Bel Geddes, Tom Helmore, and a hypnotic score by Bernard Herrmann. (128 minutes)
