This month, our First Sunday plate offering will support Food Share of Ventura County, a vital nonprofit dedicated to feeding those in need. Food Share provides meals to thousands of individuals and families facing food insecurity, relying on corporate and small business support, individual donations, and federal funding. This year, a \$400,000 federal funding cut—equivalent to eight truckloads of food—has significantly impacted Food Share's ability to serve the community. With an annual budget of \$8 million carefully planned in advance, this reduction poses a serious challenge. While only 10% of their funding comes from the federal government, the majority is sustained by the generosity of donors like you.


Sip And Check In with Sharon Kufeldt Tuesday, June 10 at 4 pm on Zoom

It's been a while since we showed a scary movie at SPCS, and this 1980 film from Stanley Kubrick is certainly one scary movie. But because it's Kubrick, "The Shining" is more ambitious than your runof-the-mill genre scare-fest flick. Film critic Roger Ebert pointed out that Kubrick was essentially messing with our sense of reality by creating a film populated by unreliable witnesses. It isn't really a ghost story; it's a closed-room mystery. Is anyone in this story telling us the truth about what happened in the isolated box where the story takes place? Are these events all occurring within the tortured imagination of one of the characters? And if so, which one? Kubrick isn't going to give us any clues – he's using the film medium to manipulate our sense of reality. This movie is memorable and effective at creating unease not only for its arresting imagery (which is spectacular), but because it never explains, never provides us with a pat answer to the basic "what happened?" question. Because it is so non-literal, it exists more in our minds than on the screen. With Jack Nicholson, Shelley Duvall, Danny Lloyd, and Scatman Crothers, and based on a novel by Stephen King.

JUST FOR FUN !! JUNE



On June 11, 2025, the Full Strawberry Moon will light up the night sky. June's full Moon typically the last full Moon of spring or the first of summer—has traditionally been called the Strawberry Moon. While strawberries certainly are a reddish-pink color and are roundish in shape, the origin of the name "Strawberry Moon" has nothing to do with the Moon's hue or appearance, despite the evocative imagery (shown in the artist rendering below). A Moon

usually appears reddish when it's close to the horizon because the light rays must pass through the densest layers of the atmosphere. Here's a fun fact: In the Northern Hemisphere, it will be the lowest Full Moon seen until 2043, staying unusually close to the horizon. When the Moon is low in the sky it appears especially big.

June Moon Folklore

- A growing Moon and a flowing tide are lucky times to marry.
- Days following both the New and Full Moons are most likely to be rainy or stormy.
- Crabbing, shrimping, and clamming are best when the Moon is full.

Fun Facts of June

- Birthstone: Pearl, Alexandrite, and Moonstone
- *Season*: Summer in Northern Hemisphere, Winter in Southern Hemisphere. The summer solstice marks the longest day of the year, while the summer equinox marks the point where day and night are of equal length.
- Notable Holidays: Juneteenth (US), Father's Day (many countries),
- June is National Safety Month in the United States, promoting awareness of safety and injury prevention.
- The Arctic Circle experiences 24 hours of daylight around the summer solstice in June.
- The June birth totem animal in Native American culture is the deer.
- June is Pride Month, celebrating LGBTQ+ communities worldwide.

- June 14th is Flag Day in the United States, commemorating the adoption of the U.S. flag.
- *Flower: Rose and Honeysuckle.* Roses are among the most recognizable flowers, often given as a sign of affection because they have long been a symbol of love. The honeysuckle, with its tubular flowers, is a magnet for hummingbirds and represents happiness and positive energy.
