Together we'll reflect on what it means to choose hope even in the face of grief, and how remembrance itself can become a form of healing, will be sharing their beautiful quilts with us that day.

Urban Wildlife Corridors: Building Bridges for Wildlife and People

Cities may seem like tough places for animals to live, but there are remarkable species all around us quietly navigating our neighborhoods, parks and backyards. In this talk, Dr. Zellmer will share how wildlife uses, and sometimes struggles to find, safe pathways across urban landscapes. She will discuss the idea of urban wildlife corridors, why they matter for both animals and healthy communities, and how thoughtful planning can build meaningful connections between people and nature in our neighborhoods.

Amanda Zellmer, Ph.D. is an Associate Professor of Biology at Occidental College in Los Angeles. Her research focuses on conservation biology and urban ecology, with a particular interest in how wildlife survives, moves, and thrives in cities. She works collaboratively with scientists, community partners, and regional agencies to help guide conservation decision-making in Southern California.

Paul is the Director of Donor Partnerships at San Gabriel Valley Habitat for Humanity in Monrovia, CA. SGV Habitat is rebuilding for low income families who lost their homes in the fire in Altadena.




SIP AND CHECK IN TUESDAY DECEMBER 9 AT 4 PM ON ZOOM

Few films resonated more completely with the times than Alan J. Pakula's "All the President's Men." When it arrived in 1976, the Watergate scandal remained fresh in the minds of an American public skating on the thin edge between cynicism and hope. Based on the book by Bob Woodward and Carl Bernstein, the film offered more of the latter through the unlikely means of glamorizing the tedious and inherently unglamorous work of investigative journalism.

Robert Redford (Woodward) and Dustin Hoffman (Bernstein), in their only film together, are unlikely heroes. The film studiously avoids the action scenes found in more conventional thrillers in favor of the fluorescent glare of the newsroom, phone calls, knocked-on doors, and hushed conversations in shadowy parking garages. There are no shootouts or car chases here, only the grinding accumulation of facts. These 007s have a license to type — not kill. Jason Robards, as the gravel-voiced Washington Post editor Ben Bradlee, supplies the journalistic guts required to allow Woodward and Bernstein to pursue the facts no matter where they might lead.

The story of these two dogged reporters relentlessly pursuing the scandal that toppled the Nixon presidency plays today as both a procedural thriller and a historical document. But its message about the indispensability of a free press and the power of simply asking the right questions is no less powerful today. Winner of three Academy Awards.

Journey of Souls presents the first-hand accounts of twenty--nine people placed in a "superconscious" state of awareness using Dr. Michael Newton's groundbreaking techniques. This unique approach allows Dr. Newton to reach his subjects' hidden memories of life in the spirit world after physical death. While in deep hypnosis, the subjects movingly describe what happened to them between lives. They reveal graphic details about what the spirit world is really like, where we go and what we do as souls, and why we come back in certain bodies. Through the extraordinary stories in this book, you will learn the specifics about:--How it feels to die--What you see and feel right after death--When and where you learn to recognize soul mates on earth-Different levels of soul: beginning, intermediate, and advanced--What happens to "disturbed" souls--The purpose of life and manifestation of a "creator". Holiday Scams

When shopping online during the holiday season—or any time of year—always be wary of deals that seem too good to be true. Don't become a scammer's next victim.

Every year, thousands of people become victims of holiday scams. Scammers can rob you of hard-earned money, personal information, and, at the very least, a festive mood.

Scams include:

- non-delivery scams, where you pay for goods or services you find online, but you never receive your items
- non-payment scams, where you ship purchased goods or services, but you never receive payment for them
- auction fraud, where a product you purchase was misrepresented on an auction site
- gift card fraud, where a seller asks you to pay with a pre-paid card

According to the Internet Crime Complaint Center's (IC3) 2024 report, non-payment and non-delivery scams cost people more than \$785 million that year. Credit card fraud accounted for another \$199 million in losses.

The IC3 receives a large volume of complaints in the early months of each year, suggesting a correlation with the previous holiday season's shopping scams.

Protect yourself

Whether you're the buyer or the seller, there are a number of ways you can protect yourself—and your wallet. Remember: If it seems too good to be true, that's because it is.

Practice good cybersecurity hygiene.

- Don't click any suspicious links or attachments in emails, on websites, or on social media. Phishing scams and similar crimes
 get you to click on links and give up personal information like your name, password, and bank account number. In some
 cases, you may unknowingly download malware to your device.
- Be especially wary if a company asks you to update your password or account information. Look up the company's phone number on your own and call the company.

Know who you're buying from or selling to.

- Check each website's URL to make sure it's legitimate and secure. A site you're buying from should have https in the web address. If it doesn't, don't enter your information on that site.
- If you're purchasing from a company for the first time, do your research and check reviews.
- Verify the legitimacy of a buyer or seller before moving forward with a purchase. If you're using an online marketplace or auction
 website, check their feedback rating. Be wary of buyers and sellers with mostly unfavorable feedback ratings or no ratings at all.
- Avoid sellers who act as authorized dealers or factory representatives of popular items in countries where there would be no such deals.
- Be wary of sellers who post an auction or advertisement as if they reside in the U.S. but then respond to questions by stating
 they are out of the country on business, family emergency, or similar reasons.
- Avoid buyers who request their purchase be shipped using a certain method to avoid customs or taxes inside another country.

Be careful how you pay.

- Never wire money directly to a seller.
- Don't pay for items with <u>pre-paid gift cards</u>. In these scams, a seller will ask you to send them a gift card number and PIN. Instead of using that gift card for your payment, the scammer will steal the funds, and you'll never receive your item.
- Use a credit card when shopping online and check your statement regularly. If you see a suspicious transaction, contact your credit card company to dispute the charge.

Monitor the shipping process.

- Always get tracking numbers for items you buy online, so you can make sure they have been shipped and can follow the delivery process.
- Be suspect of any credit card purchases where the address of the cardholder does not match the shipping address when you
 are selling. Always receive the cardholder's authorization before shipping any products.
